### Annual Meeting set for Nov. 13

Plans are being made for the 117th Annual Meeting of the American Angus Association, which is set for Monday, Nov. 13, during the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky. The meeting is open to the public and starts at 2 p.m. in South Wing Room 101 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center (KFEC).

Association members elected 341 delegates and 328 alternates from the United States and Canada to conduct the Association's business, to select officers and to elect five members to serve on the Board of Directors. Look for profiles of this year's Board candidates beginning on page 103.

If you've never attended the Annual Meeting, take this opportunity to do so. As an active member of this organization, it's your right and privilege to become involved.

The Association's annual report will be presented and distributed to the membership at the Annual Meeting.

### Mark Mayfield to appear at Annual Banquet

The Angus Super Roll of Victory (ROV) Show begins with female judging at 8 a.m. Monday, Nov. 13. Delegates will convene at 2 p.m. for the Association's 117th Annual Meeting. Angus breeders will gather for a social hour at 6 p.m. before attending the Annual Banquet at 7 p.m.

It's time to begin planning your trip to the 2001 National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver. Angus activities start Wednesday, Jan. 10, with the Angus junior heifer show at 8 a.m. in the Stadium Arena, followed by the female portion of the Super ROV show.

Thursday, Jan. 14, the focus shifts to sale bulls with judging in the Stadium Arena at 8 a.m., followed by a viewing of all sale consignments. The National Western Angus Sale will begin at 2 p.m. in the Beef Palace Auction Arena. The auction of the 2001 Angus Foundation Heifer Package will kick off the event. Sitz Angus, Dillon and Harrison, Mont., has donated the pick of their 2001 heifer calf crop to headline the offering.

The day's activities wind down with the Angus reception from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Denver Marriott City Center Hotel.

The bull show will start at 8 a.m. on Jan.

12 in the Stadium Arena. Later that day, the Angus Foundation Female Sale will begin at 3 p.m. in the yards.

On Saturday the carload and pen shows take center stage in the yards, with judging beginning at 9 a.m.

If you need a livestock premium catalog for the 2001 NWSS, you must request it. Notices, with a request form, were mailed by the show organizers to last year's exhibitors. If you need to request a form, call the show office at (303) 297-1166. The deadline for entering livestock is Nov. 15.

# **API launches e-Classifieds**

API's new e-Classified service, Angus e-Classifieds (*www.anguseclassifieds.com*), is a useful tool for buying and selling Angus cattle, equipment and real estate. The site lists bulls, cows and pairs, heifers, embryos, semen, real estate, equipment, horses, dogs, miscellaneous items, and job openings.

There are several formats from which to choose when placing an ad. The first is a textonly format, which lists up to 250 words for \$10/month. The second option includes a threegeneration pedigree, expected progeny differences (EPDs) and footnotes at a cost of \$15/listing for nine or fewer listings, \$7/listing for 10-25 listings and \$5/listing for more than 25 listings. Ads can be posted for 30, 60 or 90 days. A picture can be included for an additional \$10.

# Computer cow-calf game open to juniors and adults

Both young and old can play the computer cow-calf game administered by the Junior Activities Department.

Each player is issued a herd of 50 Angus cows, complete with performance records and EPDs, plus a battery of herd bulls from which to choose. You select the matings and send them to the Association. In just a few weeks, you receive information about your calf crop. A total of five calf crops are produced throughout the game.

Winners in both junior and adult divisions are recognized. Junior members who place in the top 10 also earn points toward the Crystal Award and for their state in the sweepstakes contest at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS).

The deadline to sign up for this year's game is Jan. 5, 2001. All junior members participate for free; there is a \$15 charge for adults.
