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Nation's third-oldest Angus herd celebrates century of production

Family, friends and fellow breeders from nearly half of the nation's states came to pay tribute and to celebrate a century of producing Angus cattle by the Laflin family on Aug. 19. Hosted by Bob and Barbara Laflin, their children and grandchildren, the 100th anniversary celebration was unique not only due to its recognition of longevity, but because two other Angus herds recognized as being among the oldest in existence in the United States—Woodlawn Angus, Creston, Ill., and Sunnyslope Angus, Lanesboro, Minn.—were represented at the field day.

Laflin's grandfather, E.B. Laflin, started the herd in Nebraska in 1900, and his son, L.E. Laflin, continued the business. Bob Laflin and his brother and sisters are continuing the Angus heritage with their children and grandchildren.

Lew Laflin, Crab Orchard, Neb., Angus breeder, along with Pat (Laflin) Reichenbach and Shirley (Laflin) Larson, sisters of Bob and Lew, and most of their immediate families were in attendance. Bob Laflin's children—Sharee Sankey, R.D. Laflin, Karen Laflin and Guy Laflin—and grandchildren—Cody and Jeanna Sankey, Josh Laflin and Clinton Laflin—helped with the festivities.

The Kansas House of Representatives presented Laflin Ranch with a tribute recognizing their Angus herd as the state's oldest.

Kansas Gov. Bill Graves, while proclaiming Kansas Angus Week, gave special recognition to the Laflins' century of Angus production.

Jackson is survived by his mother, wife and three brothers.

Williams, a native of Atlanta, served as chairman of the board of First Nation Bank (FNB) and as a board member of Blue Circle Industries. Prior to and during his involvement with FNB, he served as president of Williams Brothers Inc., a family-owned conglomerate that comprised concrete, masonry, lumber and buildingmaterial businesses known throughout the Southeast.

Williams also served as chairman and board member of the Department of Natural Resources and Georgians for Better Transportation, Trust Co. Bank, Peachtree Bank, CSX Railroad, Western Railroad, and Golden Poultry. He was president of the Atlanta Building Materials Association, trustee for the University of Georgia Foundation, and was active in the Georgia political arena for more than 40 years. Williams was active in the Georgia, Atlanta, DeKalb and Newton chambers of commerce, and he was instrumental in bringing DeKalb Technical Institute to the Newton County area.

Williams owned and operated Senah Plantation, a working farm and game preserve in Albany, Ga. He and his wife were members of the First United Methodist Church in Covington.

He is survived by his wife of 58 years, Ruth M. Williams; daughters Kay Cantrell and Alice Toonk; and son, John B. "Jay" Williams, all of the Atlanta area. Other survivors include six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and two brothers.
