

#### Annual Meeting set for Nov. 12

Plans are in place for the 118th Annual Meeting of the American Angus Association, which is set for Monday, Nov. 12, during the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky. The meeting is open to the public and starts at 2 p.m. in South Wing Conference Center Room 101 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center (KFEC).

Association members elected 349 delegates and 336 alternates from 46 states and Canada to conduct the Association's business, to select officers and to elect five members to serve on the Board of Directors. Look for profiles of this year's Board candidates beginning on page 93.

If you've never attended the Annual Meeting, take this opportunity to do so. As an active member of the Association, it's your right and privilege to become involved.

The Association's annual report will be presented and distributed to the membership at the Annual Meeting, along with other reports on happenings within the Association, Angus Productions Inc. (API), Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) and the Angus Foundation.

(AHIR), check artificial insemination (AI) certificate inventories, access your personal account information, and access many other databases and services online.

Utah. Deanna Scrimger, CAB Olympic coordinator, will give an overview of the brand's involvement with the planning and organization of the Games and of how this event will increase brand awareness with consumers.

Things kick off Sunday, Nov. 11, with the junior heifer show at 8 a.m., followed by the American Angus Auxiliary brunch at 9 a.m. and Annual Meeting at 11 a.m.

At 1 p.m. an update on the Association's

member logon services and an overview of CAB suppliership to the 2002 Winter Olympic Games will take place before the open meeting for Board candidates and delegates at 2 p.m.

Later that day, the Auxiliary will host a reception in honor of its 50th anniversary from 2 to 4 p.m., followed by the Angus reception from 6 to 8 p.m.

The Angus Super Roll of Victory (ROV) Show begins with female judging at 8 a.m., Monday, Nov. 12. From 9 to 11 a.m., a workshop on the Association's Angus Information Management Software (AIMS) program and Crystal Reports will be conducted at the KFEC.

Delegates will convene at 2 p.m. for the Association's 118th Annual Meeting. Angus breeders will gather at the Executive West for a social hour at 6 p.m. before attending the Annual Banquet at 7 p.m.

#### History book on sale in Louisville

The American Angus Association — A Historic Angus Journey, 1883-2000 will be available for purchase this fall. Keith Evans, former director of communications and public relations for the Association, wrote the book, which traces the Association from its founding to the present. It includes more than 300 pages of photographs and history of the Association.

A Historic Angus Journey walks the reader through the Association's 117-year history leading up to the 21st century. It covers the boom years following World War I through the disastrous recession and depression years of the 1920s and 1930s, and it tells the story of how the Association was almost split apart in the effort to end proxy voting and to install a democratic form of government.

The book tells about the leaders whose efforts changed the Association over the years. Readers will learn about the fight to control dwarfism in the 1950s and the programs that were developed to prevent a repeat of that genetic defect scare. Other highlights include the development of the performance records program and national sire evaluation, the rocky early years of CAB and its tremendous success, plus much more. You can purchase your copy in the lobby at the Executive West in Louisville. Evans will sign books during the Angus reception on Sunday evening and before and after the Annual Banquet on Monday evening. If you're not planning to attend the Annual Meeting, books can be purchased afterward from the Association. All orders placed at the Annual Meeting or shortly afterward will be delivered before Christmas.

Thursday, Jan. 17, sale bulls take the stage, with judging in the Stadium Arena at 8 a.m. followed by a viewing of all sale consignments. The National Western Angus Sale begins at 2 p.m. in the Beef Palace Auction Arena with the selling of the Angus Foundation Heifer Package. The day concludes with the Angus reception from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at the Denver Marriott City Center Hotel.

The ROV bull show begins at 8 a.m. on Friday, Jan. 18, in the Stadium Arena. Later that day, the Angus Foundation Female Sale will begin at 3 p.m. in the Livestock Center Auction Arena.

On Saturday, Jan. 19, Angus activities move to the yards with the carload and pen show at 9 a.m.
