# Oklahoma State University Animal Science Department Master Breeder Award

In the last 46 years, this award has been presented a total of 28 times.

Al Rutledge was born on a farm west of Mooreland, Okla., the oldest of 10 boys. His family later moved to a farm north of Woodward, Okla., where Al attended grade school in a one-room school. He graduated from Ft. Supply High School in 1942 and

was a Star Farmer of his FFA chapter.

Honorably discharged from the Navy in 1946, he enrolled in the Animal Science Department at Oklahoma A&M College in 1947. During his first semester in college, Al was seated next to a girl named Betty Seaman from Ripley, Okla. They were married in December of 1949 after Al returned from Chicago where he was a member of the Oklahoma A&M Livestock Judging Team that placed fourth at the International.

While in college, Al lived and worked at the swine farm for one year before he moved to the beef cattle barn where he became assistant herdsman.

After graduation, Al managed Windy Hill Angus Cattle in West Frankfort, Ill., before returning to Oklahoma to serve as herdsman at Angus Valley Farm near Sand Springs. In 1953, Al returned to Oklahoma

A&M as the beef cattle herdsman when his former boss, Orville Dewall, retired from the position.

In 1955, he showed the champion Angus steer at Ft. Worth for Oklahoma A&M. He also raised and sold a Register of Merit Hereford Bull for the college. Al served as herdsman for 10 years, then was assigned to the Live Animal Evaluation Center. Al retired from Oklahoma State University (OSU) in 1990, but he is far from slowing down.

Al and Betty run about 30 Angus cows. From an Angus he purchased in 1956 for \$165, he bred Angus cattle for six generations until he produced the reserve grand champion Angus heifer at the 1996 National Junior Angus Show in Kansas City, Mo. In 1998, Al sold an Angus heifer that won several shows before being named the grand champion heifer at the 1999 All-American Angus Futurity in Louisville, Kv.

On three different tests, Rutledge Angus topped the OBI Bull Test Sale held west of Stillwater. Until January of this year, Rutledge Angus held the record for the top gaining Angus bull at the Panhandle State Bull Test in Goodwell, Okla.

Through the years, Al has served on the Payne County Cattlemen's Association, where he served two terms as president. He also served on the Payne County Fair Board and the Payne County Farm Bureau board of directors. He was president of the Northeast Oklahoma Angus Association and inducted into the Payne County Producers' Hall of Fame in 1999.

Al and Betty had three children, one is deceased. They have three granddaughters and nine greatgrandchildren. One granddaughter and great-grandson are deceased.
