I am well aware that these changes have been controversial within our membership — even divisive at times. I talk with others who are frustrated and want assurances there will be no more changes. I talk with members who wish the Association were moving faster, and yet others

who want us to pump the brakes. I truly respect all opinions because they are rooted in those members' perspectives and their realities.

I believe the demand for registered Angus seedstock outpaces that of other breeds today because the commercial cattleman has always been front and center. Angus breeders have adopted technology to produce seedstock that fits their customers' needs.
