





Houston Portrait Hung

Ben Houston receives the livestock industry's highest honor by being inducted into the Saddle and Sirloin Club.

en has a very good eye for quality. He works with good cattle and good people."

That statement by close friend and business partner Keith Russell explains in part why Ben Houston was inducted into the exclusive Saddle and Sirloin Club. Houston was honored and his portrait was presented

during a banquet at the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky.

Russell said

The artist, Richard Halstead of Evanston, Ill., described the painting process as a symbolic one. He spent a week with Houston's family in order to understand how Ben would be best represented. Houston is the first ever to be featured on horseback.

"Painting a portrait is putting a human face to a symbol or idea," Halstead said. "His daughter-in-law Diane said Houston's horsemanship is representative of his style of leading people, because he is both commanding and kind."

The man

Houston was born Aug. 13, 1929, on a

ranch near Buckingham, Colo. He is the youngest of seven children and son of pioneer Angus breeders Walter and Minnie Houston. In 1938, at age 9, he showed his first calf at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo., with his father. Houston's experience was the beginning of what would be a distinguished career in the

cattle industry.

Before starting his own operation, he worked as herdsman for Norgren Polled Hereford Ranch, managed Hilltop Angus for Judge George Doll, joined the Austin Moody Sale management organization and managed Haystack Angus Ranch. After experimenting with several breeds, Houston said his choice to

work with purebred Angus has kept his customers coming back.

Houston and his wife, Anita, bought a ranch near the Saint Vrain River near Platteville, Colo. In 1968, Houston bought an 8-month-old Angus bull named Nobleman for \$2,500 because he was a little taller than the other calves. He entered him at the International Livestock Show in Chicago, Ill.

Russell said he and Houston knew they had a contender with the bull. The Angus bull won his breed and later, even before all the bulls had entered the showring, the judge named Nobleman the International Grand Champion Bull.

Aristocrat Angus

This was the beginning of Aristocrat Angus, Houston's ranching operation. At the 1994 Great Western Beef Exposition, Aristocrat's five steers were named supreme champion, selected from among 50 sire groups representing 19 breeds and nine states.

Houston continues to search for ways to improve the Angus breed by selecting for quality and making intelligent choices.

David Ames, animal sciences professor at Colorado State University (CSU), spoke of Houston's revolutionary project that involved sending semen and live bulls to the Ukraine. The air shipment consisted of 600 head of cattle, frozen semen and 2,000 frozen embryos. After that project proved successful, Houston sent similar shipments to Mexico, Canada, Australia, Japan, Argentina and Costa Rica

"He is living the American dream as a stockman. He is about as good as I think it gets," Ames said.

At the 2001 American Angus Association Annual Meeting, Houston was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation for his significant contributions to the Angus breed.

Continuing legacy

In 1976 Houston was elected to the Executive Committee of the National Western. He was elected president in 1985 and chairman of the board in 1999. He has maintained his involvement in the industry by establishing the National Western Scholarship program in 1983 for agriculture students at Western and Midwestern colleges.

Houston said he anticipates even more challenges for the beef industry in the future.

"The coming years will charge our breeders to keep beef as the most desired center-of-the-dinner menu [item]. There will be men with the foresight, courage and resources to face the challenge," he said.

Houston has three sons, Richard, Scott and Skylar, and a daughter, Pam, along with eight grandchildren. The entire family is involved in maintaining the Aristocrat operation. He follows his parents' example each day by living his life with perseverance and Christian values.

"Love of family, owning a smart horse and a desire to breed good cattle have been easy decisions to make," he said.

A video of Houston's life was shown during the banquet, followed by the presentation of the portrait by Halstead and Russell.

Pat Grant, president and CEO of the NWSS in Denver, Colo., described Houston's legacy appropriately with a few choice words: "By his quiet he speaks, by his presence he leads."

Angus Members Judge Well

Teams compete in the 98th annual National Collegiate Livestock Judging Competition.

ormer National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) chairman Tom Patterson, Columbus, Mont., won the overall individual title at the 2002 National Collegiate Livestock Judging Competition. The contest was held in conjunction with the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky.

Participants ranked beef cattle, sheep and swine based on breeding and market values, and provided oral reasons for their rankings. Top individuals and top teams were recognized at an awards brunch Nov. 19. Each team's score consisted of the sum of five individual scores.

Other Angus juniors who ranked in the top five in species categories included Jamie King, Tiffin, Ohio, placing fourth in sheep. King is a current director on the NJAA board. Jake Grass, Owatonna,
