**G.N. "Butch"** and **Patsy Neumeyer** of Golden Chute Ranch Inc., Walker, Iowa, have been named Iowa's Seedstock Producers of the Year. The award, sponsored annually by the Iowa Beef Breeds Council, will be awarded to the Neumeyers Feb. 9, 2004, at the Iowa Beef Expo Kick-Off Program.

The Seedstock Producer of the Year is a coveted award among Iowa's purebred breeders. The purpose of the award is to

honor outstanding cattle producers in the seedstock industry. Each purebred breed association is given the opportunity to nominate one candidate for the award. Applications are reviewed by the Seedstock Committee, which gives careful consideration to producers' programs in their entirety, including recordkeeping, industry participation and leadership, merchandising programs, selection criteria and herd improvement throughout time.

The Neumeyers have been in the cattle

seedstock business for 38 years. They have 200 Angus cows in their seedstock-breeding herd. They also have 20 cows in their commercial herd. They have kept performance records for 35 years.

The initial purchase of 10 heifers in 1965 from the Le & Be herd formed the herd's foundation. Based on his previous Angus experience with Neumeyer Bros. in the 1950s, Butch quickly started their herd on a regimen of data collection and selection based on performance records, keeping replacement females that excelled in growth and exhibited the fleshing ability and fertility that are trademarks of Golden Chute females.

**Russell "Russ" Denowh,** Sidney, Mont., 77, died Nov. 21.

He was born May 22, 1926, in Cartwright, N.D., to Julius and Naomi Denowh. He married Patricia "Pat" Gartner in 1950 in Sidney, Mont.

Russ and Pat lived on the farm in Fairview for a short time, then moved west of Sidney and farmed and ranched with Pat's father, Joe Gartner. In 1957 Russ and Joe began their registered Angus business, forming Gartner-Denowh Angus Ranch.

Russ was a member of Saint Matthew's Catholic Church and the Knights of Columbus. He was a 4-H leader and a supporter of Richland Youth Hockey.

Russ was an innovator in the Angus industry. Throughout the years, Gartner-Denowh gained national recognition for performance cattle. He was a member of the American Angus Association, Eastern Montana Angus Association and a past president of the Montana Angus Association. He was inducted into the American Angus Heritage Foundation in 1997 and was the first recipient of the Wayne Stevenson Memorial Award of Excellence. He served on the board of directors at the Stockman Bank and the Sidney Livestock Market Center.

He was a great believer in supporting youth and young cattle breeders.

He is survived by his wife; daughters Gail, Loretta, Pam and Christine; sons Michael and Paul, nephew Donald; brother Jim; 21 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

**Jerry Williams,** 63, Lockney, Texas, died Nov. 19 at his residence.

He was born July 15, 1940, in Winters, Texas, to Loise and Ilene Shuffield Williams. He married Frances Kay Golden in 1960 in Lockney. She preceded him in death on Dec. 14, 2001.

# **Angus breeder makes donation to education**

A Twin Bridges, Mont., rancher has arranged to donate her registered Angus seedstock operation, the Talon Ranch, to the Montana State University (MSU) College of Agriculture. The Board of Regents approved the gift at their Nov. 20, 2003, meeting in Bozeman.

Cam Cooper, owner and operator of the Talon Ranch, has made arrangements to bequeath her estate, including the ranch lands, registered Angus cattle, buildings, equipment and liquid assets to the College in order to offer hands-on experience to MSU students interested in the Angus seedstock business.

The Talon Ranch, which bills itself as "small but special," is a niche provider of quality



Angus bloodlines. According to Mike Tess, head of the department of animal and range sciences at MSU, the ranch includes native rangelands and irrigated hay and pasture production, wildlife habitat and exceptionally managed riparian areas. The ranch, which is located on the Big Hole River north of Twin Bridges, is also under a conservation easement.

Tess said that Cooper's vision in donating the property to the college is to offer "an educational resource for students in agriculture. She wants to help students learn the seedstock business, and she is dedicated to the Angus breed."

"The Talon Ranch is a special place that I would like to see used by the College of Agriculture well into the future for teaching students about the value of the seedstock industry," Cooper said.

Jim Peterson, the MSU College of Agriculture interim associate dean for development and external relations, said MSU students may begin working as interns on the ranch as soon as summer 2004. "This gift of a future estate will provide excellent teaching and research opportunities for our students," he said.

"Cam is in love with Montana, and she's in love with ranching — especially the seedstock business," Tess said. "She wants to share what she's learned with students and provide them the opportunity to learn in a working environment."
