We would like to congratulate these 26 juniors (nine from 1990 and 17 from 1989). They represent the top of NJAA's graduating class. We wish them much success in future endeavors and hope to see them continue to take an active role in our Angus industry as breeders and future leaders.

Outstanding juniors are recognized at several steps during their involvement with the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA). Gold pins represent the $culmination\ of\ several$ years, perhaps a decade, of involvement with the breed's junior program. Intermediate steps are the Bronze and Silver Awards.

Each level requires participationand achievement in leadership. show competition, performance testing, as well as the production and merchandising of Angus cattle. To qualify for the Gold Award, juniors must have received Bronze and Silver recognition, then apply during their final year of eligibility as a NJAA member.

Complete and accurate records are vital if applying for any of these awards. Contact the junior activities department at the Association for further details on this educational program.

Darrell Bowman.

Waynesboro, Va., son of Dr. Kenneth and Nancy Bowman. Darrell attends Florida Institute of Technology where he is studying aviation psychology. He began his NJAA membership in 1979.
