Performance Programs

John Crouch, 26 years

Director of performance programs

Responsibilities: Oversees the performance programs of the American Angus Association, which include National Cattle Evaluation (NCE), national sire evaluation, the Pathfinder program, Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) and international evaluation of Angus cattle.

John says he most enjoys working with Angus breeders, both seedstock and commercial, in implementing programs that result in producing a higher-quality, moreconsistent product.

Her family includes two grown sons, two grandsons and one granddaughter.


Diana King, 2 years AHIR assistant

 Before production of a sale book begins, have all animals registered and submit all information that might affect the data in the Association's computer system.

 Try to use a consistent system of registering the names of your animals; an example would be to eliminate spaces in name prefixes, such as ABC vs. A B C, so the computer organizes the animals correctly.

 When sending in sale book information, make sure all copy and photos are together. Away from the office, Fern enjoys English-style horseback riding and foxhunting. She also has two children and two grandchildren.
