Association growth/loss

Registrations held steady as membership sagged slightly and requests for performance data reached all-time highs, according to the year end numbers for the American Angus Association.

Registrations of Angus cattle totalled 271,206, nearly steady with 2000's numbers.

Of that total, 22,154 were calves produced by embryo transfer (ET), marking an 8.69% increase in that category. Transfers for the year were down, at 159,029, a decrease of 6.03% from fiscal year (FY) 2000.

New regular members in FY 2001 totaled 2,612, slightly fewer than last year. Junior memberships were up 3.31% for the year.

As performance records continue to be important in the breeding and marketing of Angus genetics, members reported an all-time-high number of weight records to the Performance Programs Department, submitting 693,700 in all. The total breaks down to 278,217 birth weights, 273,159 weaning weights and 142,324 yearling weights.
