Four individuals who have made significant contributions to the Angus breed have been selected for induction into the Angus Heritage Foundation. They will be honored Nov. 18 at the Association's Annual Banquet during Angus activities at the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) in Louisville, Ky.

The 2002 honorees are Lyle Haring, De Witt, Iowa; Dave McMahon, Fort Smith, Ark.; and Ray Woodward, Miles City, Mont. W.J. Harrer, formerly of Montana, will be inducted posthumously.

Biographies of the inductees will be published in the December Angus Journal.

Glenowen Farm honored as Historic Angus Herd

The Association recently awarded its Historic Angus Herd Award to Glenowen Farm, Round Hill, Va. The herd is owned by Charles W. "Bill" Thomas.

The herd was founded in 1948 by the Thomas family, with foundation cattle purchased from Gilnockie Farm, Culpeper, Va., and Amandale Farm, Upperville, Va. The herd now consists of 100 Angus cows and is managed by Thomas.

The American Angus Association recognizes herds that have been in the continuous production of registered Angus cattle for 50 years or more by the same person or members of the immediate family with the Historic Angus Herd Award.
