Doran Butler, 81, passed away on Sept. 29 at Spring Cove Ranch near Bliss, Idaho. Butler was born May 30, 1919, to Effie and Arthur Butler. His parents homesteaded Spring Cove Ranch and purchased their



first Angus cattle in 1919. Butler devoted his life to loving support of his large family, building his ranch and contributing to the Bliss and Gooding County communities. He married Helen Havenor on June 4, 1944. They

raised seven children. Butler supported the Bliss Community Church as an organizer, chairman of the church board and lifelong member.

He was a charter member of the National Cattlemen's Association, which became the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. He was a member of the Idaho Angus Association, which his father founded. He chaired several local grazing organizations while serving on the Public Lands Committee of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association.

He was elected to the Idaho Livestock Hall of Fame in 1989, and his family was the recipient of the FHA Idaho Farm Family of the Year award in 1973. In 1991 the American Angus Association honored his herd with a Historic Angus Herd Award.

He is survived by his wife and daughters Barbara Butler of Mountain Home, Idaho; Rebecca Knapp of Spokane, Wash.; Mary Butler of Boise, Idaho; Jane Butler-Nix of Yakima, Wash.; and Jill Turner of Ashland, Ore.
