Richard "Dick" Tokach, Mandan, N.D., was presented the Top Hand Award from the North Dakota Stockmen's Association (NDSA) at their 73rd annual convention and trade show in Bismarck. Tokach's name will be added to an elite list of only 17 past recipients.

Tokach purchased the family farm in 1971 from his father. His family built a noted registered and commercial Angus operation known as Tokach Angus Ranch.

Tokach was an early adopter of performance testing and among the first to enroll his cattle in the Association's Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) program. Today his sons Richard C. and Brad continue the performance testing.

The NDSA Board of Directors selected Gene Harris, Killdeer, N.D., as an Honorary Lifetime NDSA Membership Award winner. This award is given to individuals who have made significant contributions to the NDSA and to the beef industry.

Harris took over his family's ranch in 1981 after his father died. Today, he and his family raise about 550 Angus and Angus-based cows.

► IN PASSING

Paul May, 79, of Mineral Point, Wis., died at home on Oct. 7. He was a former director of the American Angus Association.

He was born June 21, 1923, the eldest son of Herman and Mae May. In 1947 he married Lucille Regan, and they established Fernvale Angus Farm together in 1953. He and Lucille raised seven children on their family farm. In 1981 he formed a partnership with his son Gregg.

In recognition of his many contributions to Wisconsin agriculture, May received several honors and awards. He was honored with a lifetime membership to the Wisconsin Angus Association and received a Wisconsin Livestock Breeders' Association award. He also received a citation by the Wisconsin State Senate in 1989, recognizing his "lifelong service to agriculture and rural life," and a citation from the Wisconsin State Legislature awarding him the Master Agriculturist Award in 1985.

In 1993 he founded the World Beef Expo. The Paul J. May Award for Outstanding Service was created by the World Beef Expo and is awarded annually.

May showed and judged cattle throughout the United States. He was president of the Wisconsin Angus Association and Wisconsin Livestock Breeders', and an inductee and subsequent president of Master Farmers.

May is survived by his wife; children, Gary, Gregg, Teresa, Dennis, Marcia, Colleen and Donna; 14 grandchildren; and two stepgrandchildren.
