- ► The \$B, \$F and \$G values are dollarbased indexes designed to assist commercial producers in making genetic comparisons while considering multiple traits (see "Putting It All Together," page 85).
- ▶ The AngusSource program is an identification and marketing program for Angus and Angus-cross commercial steers and replacement females (see "AngusSource a step toward the future," page 25, and "Program offers means of customer service," page 142 of the October 2003 Angus Journal).

At each of the upcoming seminars, Bowman and Perrier will also lead an interactive discussion about current Association programs, plus potential genetic programs and customer-service options.

"These seminars are an opportunity to reach out to our members and those who use Angus genetics to increase awareness of and answer questions about two of our newest programs," says John Crouch, Association executive vice president. "Most importantly, we encourage Angus breeders to attend and provide input to Association staff relative to our programs and services and ways they can best serve members now and in the future."
