## Phipps receives national FFA award

Wravenna Phipps, Kearney, Neb., was named the national winner of the Agricultural Communications-Entrepreneurship/Placement Proficiency Award at the 2003 National FFA convention Oct. 31. The awards recognize FFA members who excel as ag entrepreneurs, employees or volunteers while they gain hands-on career experience.

## State-sponsored sale supports juniors

The Washington Angus Association (WAA) has added several incentives for youth to purchase animals through its annual Evergreen Exclusive Angus Sale. Junior members receive points for show placings in

the "High Point Heifer" program. For a heifer to qualify, it must be purchased from the Evergreen Exclusive Sale.

Kevin Jensen of Tenino, Wash., and Melissa Kitchen of Chimacum, Wash., each received \$800 in premiums for showing heifers purchased in last year's sale.

The WAA also offered, for the first time, a "Dash for Cash" program that awards youth who purchased heifers in this year's sale. Juniors receive immediate money in the form of savings bonds, should they win grand or reserve champion honors at designated shows.

These programs proved to be an incentive, as juniors purchased a total of 21 females offered at the 2003 sale. They purchased a total of 22 project steers.

## ► Bronze and Silver awards

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels in the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP). The awards are given to youth who complete an application based on their activities and involvement in the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) and raising Angus cattle. While those with photos are published as they are made available, summaries of winners since the last youth issue are published in the May and September issues of the *Angus Journal*.

### ▶ 2003 Evergreen Exclusive Angus Sale, Pasco, Wash., Oct. 18

The WAA sold a heifer package in support of the 2005 National Junior Angus Show and other state activities. The August 2002 daughter of Connealy Date-line that headlined the package was donated by Rathbun Angus, Moses Lake, Wash. Semen donated by All West/Select Sires; a flush




and freezing of embryos donated by Vance Burkes' Embryonics, Soap Lake, Wash.; and animal pharmaceutical products donated by Merial Laboratories were also contributed to the package. The animal sold to a syndicate of buyers for \$2,700. They released the package to be auctioned a second time. It was purchased by Jason Crabtree, Kingston, Wash., for \$2,500. The grand total of \$5,200 will be split, with 50% going to support the 2005 NJAS in Denver, Colo., and the remaining 50% to support junior Angus activities in Washington.

## Beartooth heifer headlines Angus Foundation Heifer Package



Beartooth Ranch, Columbus, Mont., will donate one of its outstanding heifers to headline the 2004 Angus Foundation Heifer Package. The package will sell at the 2004 National Western Stock Show (NWSS), and all proceeds from the sale go directly to the Angus Foundation, which supports youth, education and research.

The sale of the package will begin the 2004 National Western Angus Bull Sale, set for 2 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 15 in the Beef Palace Auction Arena at the National Western Complex in Denver, Colo.

The package includes BT Everelda Entense 51N, a January 2003 daughter of Twin Valley Precision E161.

In addition to the heifer, the buyer receives 30 days of free insurance from American Live Stock Insurance Co., Geneva, Ill.; free transportation to the buyer's farm or ranch provided by Lathrop Livestock Transportation, Dundee, Ill.; a flush and three embryo implants into the buyer's recipient cows from Trans Ova Genetics, Sioux Center, Iowa; Ivomec® provided by Merial; an Angus Information Management Software (AIMS) Package from the American Angus Association AIMS Department; and a banner ad from the Angus Productions Inc. (API) Web Marketing Department. Other items, to be announced later, may be added to the package.

"The generosity of Beartooth Ranch is greatly appreciated," says James Fisher, American Angus Association director of activities and junior activities. "Beartooth Ranch is donating a very complete heifer with outstanding genetics."
