Important dates for Pathfinder

Launched in 1978, the Pathfinder® Angus Program identifies superior females in the breed based on performance data submitted through Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®). To qualify, a cow must be actively enrolled in AHIR, producing her first calf near the herd's average age for first calving. Second, her first three calves must post a minimum average weaning weight ratio of 105 in a contemporary group with a minimum of five herdmates of the same sex. Lastly, calves must be sired by a registered Angus bull.

All data on females must be received by the end of the business day on Jan. 31, 2021, to be eligible for 2021 Pathfinder status. Pathfinder status will be announced on Feb. 4, 2021.

Inventory Reporting AHIR data

The new Inventory Reporting option for submitting AHIR® data is now open for enrollment. The deadline for spring enrollment is Jan. 15. Herd inventory can be established within your AAA Login account.

The fee is \$2 for each female. Requirements for active females include reporting a calf (birth date, sex, dam information), reason for no calf or disposal code for the cow.

All members enrolled in the Inventory Reporting option will have the opportunity to earn the MaternalPlus® designation. For more information regarding the Inventory Reporting option, contact the American Angus Association at 816-383-5100 or angus@angus.org.

What does Inventory Reporting mean for your herd? At 7 p.m. Dec. 4, Jerry Cassady, director of member services, and Chris Stallo, COO, will highlight key features in an Angus University (AU) webinar. "Investing in Inventory" will cover the requirements of Inventory Reporting, benefits of the program and how it plays a role in the already established MaternalPlus program.

The reporting option was introduced to capture valuable data on all animals, not just the best ones. This helps producers identify higher-performing cows by giving credit to good performers when compared to lesser-performing cattle. For Angus breeders, this capitalizes on an opportunity for genetic improvement.

National Angus Bull Sale

The 2021 National Angus Bull Sale will be Friday, Jan. 8, at 1 p.m. in the Super Barn Sale Arena during the Cattlemen's Congress in Oklahoma City, Okla. All consignments will be genomic tested; will possess a complete set of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and dollar value indexes (\$Values); and must be free of any genetic conditions recognized by the American Angus Association.

All bulls born before Jan. 1, 2020, will have passed a complete breeding soundness examination (sometimes referred to as a BSE), physical and semen, within 30 days of the sale.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).
