In Passing



Randall
Paramore, 89,
Notasulga, Ala.,
native, went to to be
with his Lord and
Savior Jesus Christ

on Sept. 30, after a courageous battle with Alzheimer's.

Born Wednesday, April 22, 1931, Randall was the youngest of nine boys and three girls born to John and Hattie Paramore. He was the only child of the 12 who did not have a middle name.

Paramore graduated from Midland City High School in 1949 and worked the next two years at the Huntingburg Furniture Company as a machine operator. During the Korean War, he joined the United States Air Force and served his country proudly for four years. While stationed in Anchorage, Alaska, he attended the University of Alaska and completed his basic courses.

He enrolled in Alabama Polytechnic Institute (API), now Auburn University, where he met the love of his life, Julia Lynch. He would fondly say he only lived for her happiness. Upon graduating from API with a bachelor's degree in vocational agriculture in 1957, he married his sweetheart.

While working on his master's degree, he taught science at Reeltown High School. In August 1960 he graduated from Auburn University and moved his wife and daughter to Greenwood, Fla., where he taught science for one year.

From 1961 to 1969, he and his family lived in Orrville, Ala., where he was the vocational agriculture teacher at Orrville High School. A son joined the family while they lived in Orrville. In July 1969 he moved his family to Notasulga, where he resided for the next 51 years. He taught at Tuskegee Public School from 1969-1977.

In 1977 he transferred to Notasulga High School, where he taught vocational agriculture until his retirement in 1992.

Paramore was a Lifetime Honorary Director of the Alabama Cattlemen's Association, and a 50-plus year member of Woodmen of the World. His life's passion was beef cattle. Throughout his teaching career, he transported numerous students and their livestock projects to shows and fairs in the state and the Southeast.

Some of his proudest moments were spent with his son, Philip, showing cattle all over the country, followed by his granddaughter and grandson showing, and later his great-granddaughter showing.

He is survived by his wife of 62 years, Julia Paramore; daughter, Julienne; son, Philip; three grandchildren; and one greatgranddaughter. He is also survived by his brother Earl, as well as several sisters, brothers-in-law, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Gloria Smith, Wadley, Ga., passed away on the weekend of Oct. 10. Gloria was a fixture at Angus events, and a friend to many. She was a longtime member of the Georgia Angus Association.

Gloria is survived by her husband Wynder Smith; her children, Alisa, Sharon and Clint; seven grandchildren; three greatgrandchildren; her siblings, Annette, Judy and Charles; and her sister-inlaw Patricia. She is also survived by several nieces and nephews.


