Important dates for Pathfinder

Launched in 1978, the Pathfinder® Angus Program identifies superior females in the breed based on performance data submitted through Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®). To qualify, a cow must be actively enrolled in AHIR, producing her first calf near the herd's average age for first calving. Second, her first three calves must post a minimum average weaning weight ratio of 105 in a contemporary group with a minimum of five herdmates of the same sex. Lastly, calves must be sired by a registered Angus bull.

All data on females must be received by the end of the business day Jan. 27, 2023, to be eligible for 2023 Pathfinder status. Pathfinder status will be announced Feb. 2, 2023.

National Angus Bull Sale

The 2023 National Angus Bull Sale will be Friday, Jan. 6, at 2 p.m. in the Super Barn Sale Arena during the Cattlemen's Congress in Oklahoma City, Okla. All consignments will be genomic-tested; will possess a complete set of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and dollar value indexes (\$Values); and must be free of any genetic conditions recognized by the American Angus Association.

All bulls born before Jan. 1, 2022, will have passed a complete breeding soundness examination (sometimes referred to as a BSE), physical and semen, within 30 days of the sale.

Angus Foundation Heifer

The Angus Foundation Heifer Package will kick off the 84th National Angus Bull Sale, Friday, Jan. 6, 2023, at the Cattlemen's Congress.

The 2023 Angus Foundation Heifer Package is donated by Coleman Angus of Charlo, Mont. The heifer, Coleman Chloe 173 (AAA+*20076459), is the Coleman Chloe female with the highest maternal weaned calf value (\$M) in the ranch's herd. She is backed by a pedigree represented by the operation's most notable cow families.

The offering includes transportation to the buyer's ranch provided by Lathrop Livestock Transportation, Dundee, Ill.; and an advanced reproductive technology package from Trans Ova Genetics, Sioux Center, Iowa.

The sale will start at 2 p.m. at the Oklahoma State Fairgrounds, in Oklahoma City, Okla.

CAB Refines Hot Carcass Weight Specification

Rewarding cattlemen and every segment of the beef industry for supplying consistent, premium beef has been a long-time focus for Certified Angus Beef (CAB).

It continues to be the focus as the brand adjusts its hot carcass weight specification to a maximum of 1,100 pounds (lb.). The revision is a result of the brand's continual work to evaluate progress of the industry, its specifications and make adjustments that support the industry's ability to produce the consistent, high-quality product consumers expect.

The brand's hot carcass weight specification is being adjusted from a maximum weight of 1,050-1,100 lb.

This change was implemented by the USDA and Canadian Beef Grading Agency Oct. 31, 2022.

With industry economics furthering the trend for heavier carcasses, cattle producers will have greater opportunity to capitalize on brand premiums. The brand estimates the hot carcass weight adjustment could increase the amount of certified carcasses 3-4%, adding approximately 200,000 certified carcasses to supply.

This change will have an immediate effect on supply; support brand partners and producers in navigating market dynamics driven by drought and tighter supplies and ultimately help deliver on growing consumer demand for years to come.

AHIR Inventory Reporting

Inventory Reporting enrollment for AHIR Inventory Reporting is open from Nov. 1 to Jan. 15. The fee is \$2 for each female enrolled. This fee covers the AHIR reporting cost for the next calf crop. Annual requirements for each female enrolled in the program include reporting a calf (birth date,

sex, dam information), a reason for no calf, or a disposal code if the cow left the herd.

For members enrolling for the first time, current herd inventory can be established within your AAA Login account. For members who enrolled last year during this time period, your inventory needs updated and all females to meet requirements to reenroll. For members who enrolled in July, now is a good time to enter the fall calving information for the females in your herd. For those interested in MaternalPlus®, weaning weights and heifer breeding records are also required.

All members enrolled in the Inventory Reporting option will have the opportunity to earn the MaternalPlus designation. In addition, members who are enrolled in the Inventory Reporting program will receive the Functional Longevity research EPD when released.

- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.
