Bronze and Silver Awards

Audrey Curtin, Blue Mound, Ill.; Margaret Davis, Bidwell, Ohio; and Madison Stratton, Appomattox, Va., have earned the National Junior Angus Association's (NJAA) Bronze and Silver awards, according to Caitlyn Brandt, events and education director of the American Angus Association in Saint Joseph, Mo. Macie Bartlow, Macomb, Ill.; Sloane Curtin, Oxford, Iowa; Charles Goodnight, Billings, Mo.; Anna McCurry, Colwich, Kan.; Kara Nesom, Deridder, La.; Conner Symons, Pearl River, La.;

Tavin Symons, Pearl River, La.; Zoey Symons, Pearl River, La.; Mollie Vick, Pope, Miss.; Reese White, Grand View, Texas; and Julia Wolfe, Raymond, Neb., have earned the Bronze award.

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the NJAA Recognition Program that began in 1972. Junior Angus breeders must apply for the awards, then meet point requirements in many areas of participation before receiving the honors. Applicants are evaluated in areas of junior Angus association activities and leadership, participation in showmanship,

contests and shows, using performance testing to improve their herd, and their progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

Serving as royalty and director for the Illinois Junior Angus Association (IJAA) is **Audrey Curtin**. The 17-yearold is from Blue Mound, Ill., and attends Taylorville High School. Curtin is the daughter of T.J. and Megan Curtin.

At the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), Curtin has participated in the mentoring program and the photography, graphic design, creative writing, livestock judging and stockman's contests.

Curtin has also attended the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) and Raising the Bar conferences.

Margaret Davis, 15, is from Bidwell, Ohio. A student at Gallia Academy High School, she is the daughter of Jon Davis and is serving the Ohio Junior Angus Association as treasurer.
