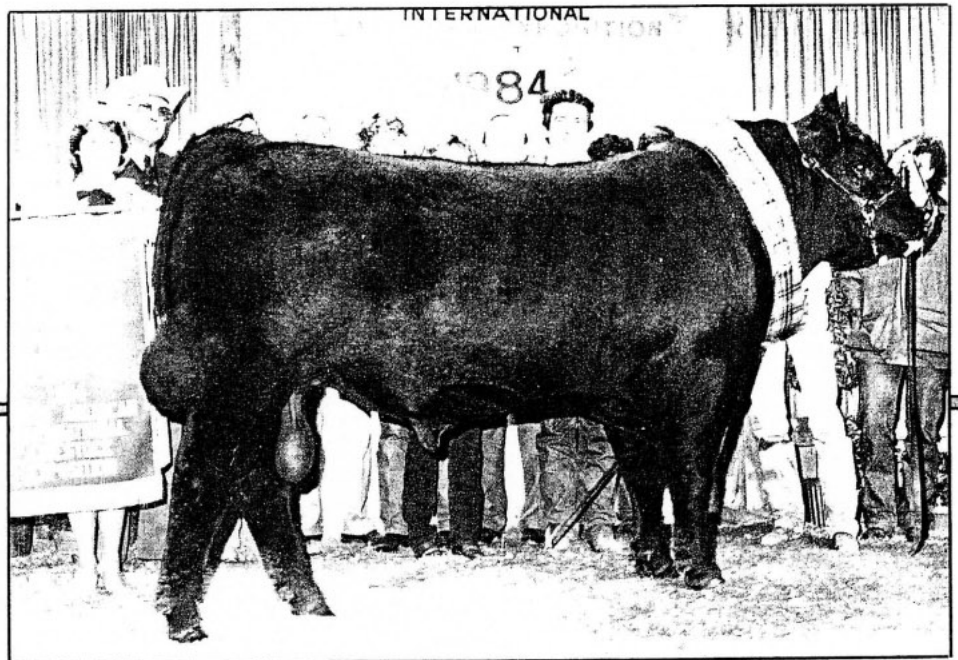


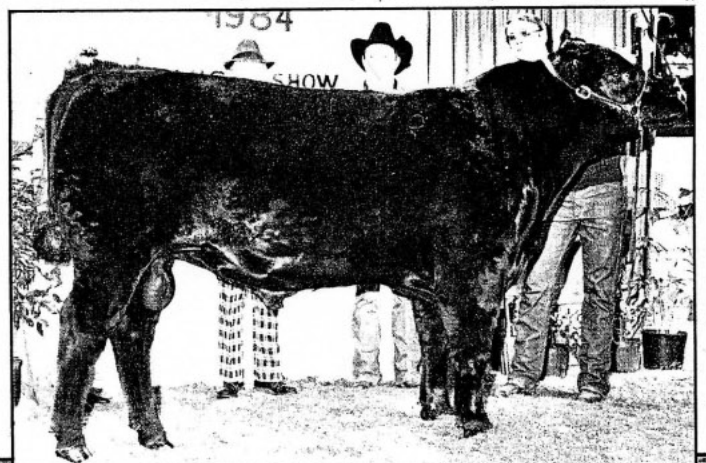

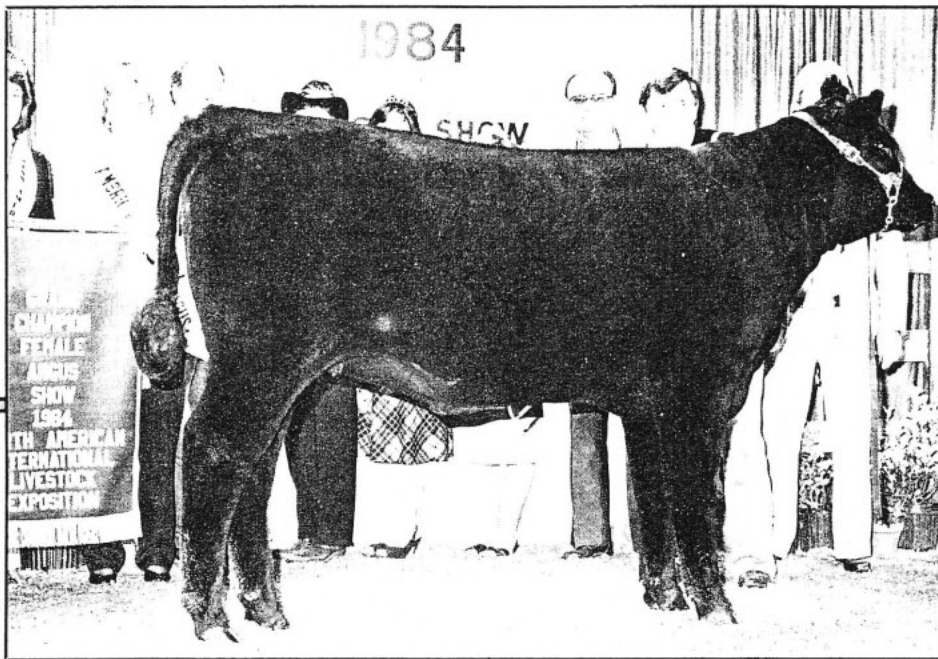
Gene Wiese, a third-generation Hereford breeder and more recently an Angus breeder too, lined up the Angus at the North American. He discussed classes in a logical and professional manner while searching for functional, sound cattle.

The mood was positive among the huge crowd of Angus breeders who took in the show, annual meeting and other events. And it's no wonder. Exhibitors led out a powerful set of contenders—157 in all—and quality ran deep in every division. Judge Wiese sorted the entries with combining ability in mind, looking for functional cattle that should grow, stay sound and be fertile. And he was applauded for his efforts.

Skarships Mr Stetson wore the plaid banner when it was all said and done, heading off many well-knowns in his journey to the winner's circle. The Ken Caryl Mr Angus 8017 son exhibited by Skarship Farm, Hillsdale, N.Y.; TJR Angus, Hastings, Neb.; and Stetson Breeders, weighed in at 2,375 lb. and suited Wiese as the "cattleman's kind."

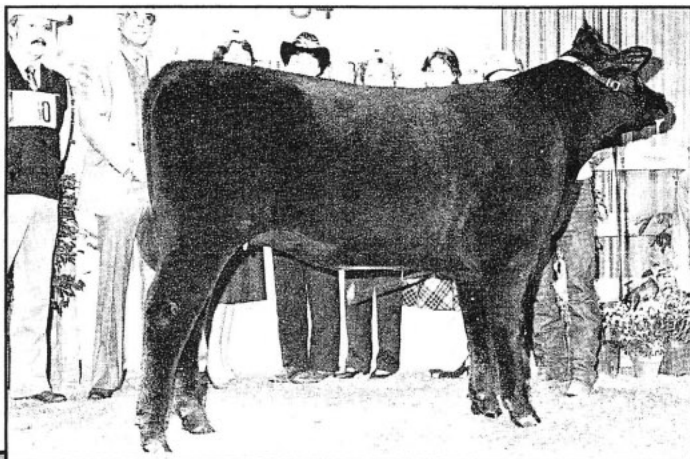
Smiles probably don't come any broader than those found in the camp of Stewart and Sons, Greensburg, Ind., when their junior champion entry SS Rising Sun 64R was slapped reserve grand champion bull. The Kruegers Foolish Pride son stepped past Greenbrae Chairman, JK Pine Tar, R&J Laredo 2273 and MA Rising Star to collect the banner.

Veterans basked in the final spotlight of the female show, but it was no easy road to glory for Windac Tiara F460 and Princess Jamie 1R. Grand champion "Tiara" first had to outclass year-long contender R&J Sybil 2003 for intermediate honors for her owners Windy Acres Ranch, Harrison, Neb.; B&L Ranch, Shawnee, Okla.; and Bert Skou, Buenos Aires, Argentina. "Jamie" stepped up to the reserve grand champion spot from the junior division for Jamie Worthington of Princeville, Ill.,

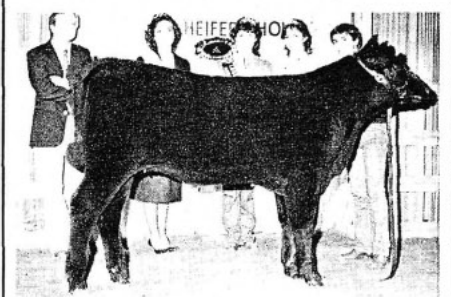

Bill Roche, regional manager in the Western states, kept the official books. He will retire this spring after 30 years of work with the Association, and was recognized in Louisville for his many efforts.



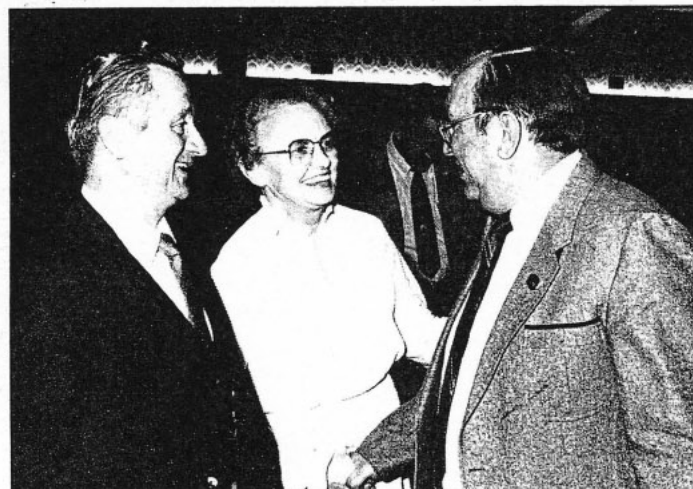

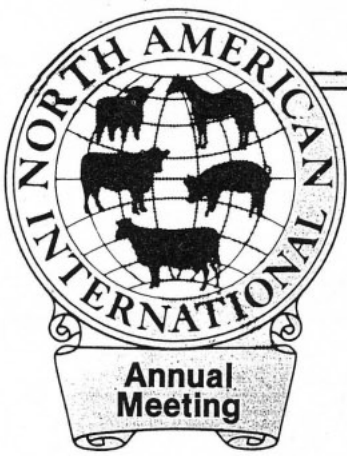

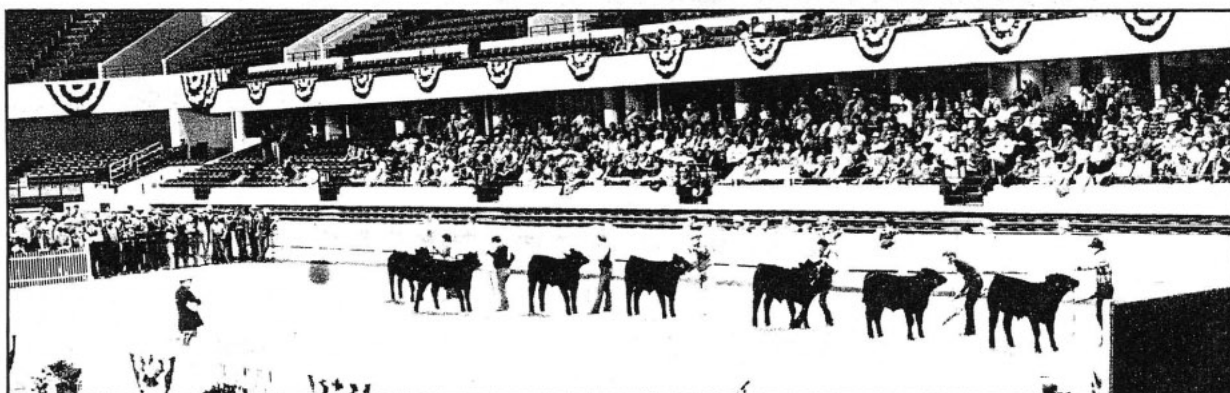
