Auxiliary Awards Scholarships to 10 Junior Angus Members

The American Angus Auxiliary awarded \$7,200 in scholarships this year to 10 outstanding Junior Angus members. There was a record number of applicants, 33 total from 20 states, who applied for the scholarship money, reports Ardyce O'Neill, Logan, Iowa, Auxiliary scholarship chairperson.

The scholarship fund of \$7,200 is divided among five girls and five boys who were awarded the money. The first place girl and boy received \$1,2000; \$900 was presented to the second place girl and boy; the third place finishers were awarded \$700; the fourth place winners received \$500; and \$300 went to the fifth place girl and boy.

In addition to the scholarships, the five girl finalists were eligible to compete for the title of Miss American Angus 1990 at the American Angus Association annual meeting held in November at the North American International Livestock Exposition in Louisville, Ky.

Lori Cash, 18, of Centre Hall, Pa., is the first-place girls' scholarship winner. A member of the American Angus Association and the Pennsylvania Junior Angus Association, Lori is the daughter of Erskine and Willie Cash.

She has been involved with her state junior Angus group for nine years and has held several offices. Lori served as show manager for the 1989 Eastern Regional Junior Angus Show, which was hosted by the Pennsylvania Junior Angus Association.

At the 1988 National Junior Angus Showmanship contest, Lori won the coveted title of "Top Showman." Not only has she received several achievement awards, Lori was named the Outstanding Pennsylvania Junior Angus Girl, and her family was named the Pennsylvania Angus Family of the Year. She recently was elected to the NJAA Board of Directors.

Lori is pursuing a career in communications at Pennsylvania State University. She plans on staying in the Angus breed and promote youth programs as they have been an important part of her life.

The first-place boys' division winner is Jason Carrico, son of Jerry and Ruth Carrico, Redfield, Iowa. This 18-year-old is an active member of his state and national Angus associations. Jason is also involved in 4-H and FFA.

Jason has 14 cows and two bulls, and from his herd has exhibited many state champions, and even bred the grand champion bred-and-owned heifer at the 1986 National Junior Angus Show.


He is a freshman at Iowa State University and has chosen the field of engineering for his major.

Eighteen-year-old Jean Macauley of Oregon, Ill., is the second-place girls' winner this year. The daughter of Roger and Roberta Macauley, Jean has been a participant in her county, district, state and national Angus associations for a number of years.

Jean has held a full slate of offices and chairmanships in these organizations, as well as 4-H and FFA. She also served as an Illinois Angus Ebonette and then was crowned the Illinois Angus Queen.

By being involved in the Angus breed and having her own herd of 12 cows, Jean has educated and helped other people. She donated 25 pounds of ground Angus beef from a bred-and-owned








