Stallo serving as interim CEO

American Angus Association Chief Operating Officer Chris Stallo is serving as interim CEO following the May 15, 2019, resignation of Allen Moczygemba who had led the Association since October 2015.

"It's been an honor to serve in this role and to work each day with a staff of incredible talent," said Moczygemba in a May 1 letter to Association members. "The American Angus Association remains the world's leading beef breed association, and I'm fortunate that I could play a small part in its success."

Updated \$Values

Changes to the dollar value indexes (\$Value) will take place this month. Updates include revisions to beef value (\$B), adding maternal weaned calf value (\$M) and rounding all \$Values to whole dollars to eliminate decimals. Quality grade (\$QG) and yield grade (\$YG) will be removed because \$QG is redundant to the marbling expected progeny difference (EPD), and \$YG is redundant to fat and ribeye area EPDs.

\$B will be updated to better reflect current end points when finishing cattle. Traits in the \$M value will include calving ease direct and maternal, weaning weight, milk, mature weight, heifer pregnancy, docility and foot score — both claw set and foot angle EPDs. The \$M has a greater emphasis on maternal traits than any of the tools currently available and will help producers to better define efficiency in a commercial cow-calf environment.

A combined index is planned to release June 2020. A comprehensive education initiative will be conducted over the next 15 months to ensure that membership can see exactly how the combined index will work, what EPDs are included and how it can be considered when making breeding decisions.

Nominations due June 7

Each eligible voting member is allowed to nominate one eligible voting member who resides in the same state or district, including himself or herself. The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

All nominations, whether submitted by mail or online, must be received in the office no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT June 7, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to all eligible voting members in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates.

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).
