Earlier this winter, Angus affiliates, individuals who are not members of the Association but who have recently purchased and received the ownership transfer of a registered Angus bull, received updated expected progeny differences

(EPDs) on all active bulls currently in their ownership. Initiated last June, this service is one more benefit that affiliates receive when their Angus seedstock suppliers transfer ownership of the bulls into the affiliate's name.

Approximately 53,000 updates were sent to affiliates nationwide. This service will likely continue on an annual basis following the January release of the National Cattle Evaluation (NCE) data. The update includes the bull's name, birth date and all EPDs available. A letter from the American Angus Association accompanies the update, thanking producers for their purchase of Angus bulls and outlining commercial services provided by the Association.

The Commercial and Industry Relations Committee of the Association's Board of Directors created this program, in an effort to increase the service to commercial users of registered Angus genetics and to carry out the goals in the Association's long-range plan. AgriLabs Ltd. sponsored the EPD update as part of its "2003 Performance Partners" sponsorship with the Association.

North Dakota to host 2003 National Angus Conference and Tour

Plans are underway for the 2003 National Angus Conference and Tour, which will be held Sept. 24-27 in Mandan, N.D. The Association has a program full of top-notch beef industry speakers lined up for the oneday conference program, and the North Dakota Angus Association (NDAA) is putting the finishing touches on the more than two-day tour, which will feature Angus herds from across the state.

The theme for the event is "Take Initiative." As the beef cattle business becomes a more competitive, profit-driven marketplace, both seedstock and commercial producers need to "Take Initiative" when selecting genetics, managing resources and exploring alternative marketing options. Members who will host stops include Tokach Angus Ranch, Ellingson Angus Ranch and Schaff's Angus Valley, all of Saint Anthony; Frey Angus Ranch, Granville; McCumber Angus Ranch, Rolette; Vollmer Angus Ranch, Wing; Brooks Chalky Butte Ranch, Bowman; and Farview Angus Ranch, Regent. Other breeders will also be featured at stops in central locations.

Look for delegate petitions in the mail soon

Preparations are already being made for the 2003 Annual Meeting this November in Louisville, Ky. The first step of the democratic election process will take place this month with the mailing of petitions to every Association member. Members can use the petitions to nominate state delegates for the 2003 Annual Meeting.

Members may nominate any member from their state, including themselves. The candidate should be actively involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the Annual Meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Nominations must be returned to the Association by June 30, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to the membership to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition this month, don't set it aside — send it in right away. June 30 will be here quicker than you think.

Association can help with junior transfers

If you know a junior member who has purchased a heifer to show and has not received the transfer papers, and if the ownership deadline for a specific show is approaching, help is available. Contact the Association at least two weeks prior to the show's ownership deadline. Every effort will be made to get the transfer processed in time. Remember, however, late transfers are never accepted, regardless of the reason.

Association offers tattoo brochure, supplies

For Angus breeders, tattooing newborn calves isn't just a process for herd identification (ID); it's an Association requirement for registration eligibility. Members who are new to the Angus business, or maybe even new to the cattle business, are often challenged by their first attempt at tattooing a calf.

The Association has a brochure available to members titled "Tattooing — Steps to Permanent Identification," which gives stepby-step instructions on the tattooing process. The brochure can help you set up a herd ID system and determine the equipment you need to tattoo a calf. It gives suggestions on how to prepare the ear before tattooing.

The Association also offers tattooing equipment — including pliers, characters and ink — for sale to members at a minimal cost.
