McBride founded his herd in 1952 with the purchase of Blades Prizemere Eonda S 5, whose breeding originated from the Fred Blades Angus herd near Holiday, Mo. Two U.S. researchers, **Michael Roberts**, a University of Missouri biochemist and animal scientist; and **Fuller Bazer**, now at Texas A&M University, received the Wolf Prize in Agriculture for their work in unraveling how a successful pregnancy exists. They were presented the award on Jan. 7.

Roberts and Bazer discovered interferontau and other proteins that enable an unborn embryo and the mother to chemically "communicate" so the pregnancy continues successfully. Their work has pioneered a greater understanding of the molecules responsible for maintaining pregnancy and continues to help scientists learn why some pregnancies are successful, while others do not come to full term.

Chuck Sylvester, general manager of the National Western Stock Show (NWSS), received the Livestock Leader of the Year award from Colorado State University's (CSU) department of animal sciences on Jan. 18. Sylvester, a CSU alumnus, has been the general manager of the NWSS for 25 years.
