**Wayne Shriver,** branch manager of the Eastern Ohio Resource and Development Center (EORDC) and owner of a cow-calf operation in Pleasant City, Ohio, won the first-ever Ohio Cattlemen's Association (OCA) Commercial Producer of the Year Award. Shriver received the award Jan. 25 at the OCA's annual banquet.

When asked about the success of his 400-head operation, Shriver said that his family was always looking for ways to change. Since the mid-1990s, the Shrivers have phased out bull-only pasture-breeding programs in favor of improving stock through estrus synchronization and artificial insemination (AI). They also have acquired strip-mined property for pasture, bringing their total of owned and rented reclaimed land to 4,000 acres.

During the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) 84th Annual Convention, **John** and **Jennifer Smith** of Puryear, Tenn., received the AFBF Achievement Award, making them the nation's outstanding young farmer couple. They are partners in Rockin' S Angus.

The Smiths farm 2,000 acres, including 1,800 acres of row crops and 70 acres of tobacco. In addition, they have 150 head of registered Angus cattle and are involved in an extensive embryo transfer (ET) program and another program to market Angus bulls. Both are involved in their county Farm Bureau and numerous other community activities.

The couple received a 2003 Dodge Ram pickup as their grand prize. They also received a \$2,500 voucher from Syngenta Crop Protection, the event's sponsor; and free registration to the 2003 Young Farmers and Ranchers (YF&R) Leadership Conference in Hershey, Pa., in February.

The Achievement Award recognizes young farmers and ranchers who have excelled in their farming or ranching operations and who have exhibited superior leadership abilities. Participants are evaluated on a combination of their agriculture operation growth and financial progress, Farm Bureau leadership and leadership outside Farm Bureau.

**David Mullins** has been named the American Angus Association regional manager in the Northeast, effective March

10. He will relocate to Star Tannery, Va. His responsibilities include serving members and breeders and representing the American Angus Association and *Angus Journal* at sales, shows, field days and other




