Delegate nomination forms

Preparations are being made for the American Angus Association's 2019 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Reno, Nev. Forms to nominate delegates to the annual meeting will be mailed to every active life and regular member of the Association who qualifies as an eligible voting member prior to April 5, according to the Bylaws.

The nomination period is April 8-June 7. Each eligible voting member is allowed to nominate one eligible voting member who resides in the same state or district, including himself or herself. The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Signed nomination forms must be received in the Association office by mail or online submission no later than 4:30 p.m. CDT on June 7, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to all eligible voting members in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the form, please return it promptly.

Check voting eligibility before April 5

American Angus Association members wanting to participate in the election of board members and other business this fall need to meet three eligibility requirements before 4:30 p.m. CDT April 5.

According to Association bylaws,

only eligible voting members can nominate, be nominated, vote or be elected in the annual election of delegates. To participate in the electoral process and other business during the 136th Annual Convention of Delegates, a member must be considered an eligible voting member and must meet all of the following requirements by 4:30 p.m. CDT April 5:

- Active regular or life membership (dues paid in full)
- 18 years of age or older
- Registered at least one animal or completed at least \$250 of business with the Association or Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI) within the preceding 12 months from when the nomination period begins (from April 6, 2018, to April 5, 2019)

The nomination period for 2019 begins April 8; therefore, these criteria must be met by the end of the previous business day, Friday, April 5. It is encouraged to submit all necessary requirements with enough time for completion prior to April 5.

The Association will mail delegate nomination forms only to active regular and life members who qualify as eligible voting members prior to 4:30 p.m. CDT on April 5.

Updated \$Value Indexes

The American Angus Board of Directors approved changes to the \$Value Indexes during the February board meeting Feb. 18-21, 2019. Updated \$Value Indexes will be available this June, and changes include revisions to Beef Value (\$B), updating the Weaned Calf Value (\$W) model to the new Maternal Value (\$Maternal) and rounding all \$Values to whole dollars to eliminate decimals. Quality Grade (\$QG) and Yield Grade (\$YG) will be removed because \$QG is redundant to the Marbling EPD, and \$YG is redundant to Fat and Ribeye area (REA) EPDs.

In addition, a balanced index will be implemented June 2020 with a complete education plan to be executed with the membership and industry to take place over the next 15 months.

Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI) staff worked alongside AbacusBio, an animal breeding technology consulting company, to develop and conduct the survey, analyze the results and update economic models. The AGI team reviewed the findings and put together recommendations to best serve the goals of the membership and the breed. The recommendations were reviewed by the Board, and several were approved.

\$B will be updated to better reflect current end points when finishing cattle. \$W will become \$Maternal and will include more EPDs, such as maternal calving ease, heifer pregnancy and docility. Also effective in June 2019, all \$Values will be rounded to whole dollars, eliminating the decimals, or cents, portion of each \$Value.

Angus launches national ad campaign

The American Angus Association recently launched a new national advertising campaign promoting the value of registered Angus genetics to commercial cattle producers. The new campaign showcases the registered Angus bull, cow and calf, with each to be promoted within its respective season.

Along with the print campaign, a new companion website serves as a gathering point for cattle producers who desire to learn more about historic Angus strengths in maternal, carcass and performance qualities.

The first advertisement, named "Director of Breed Improvement," showcases the dominance of the Angus bull and his influence on America's cow herd. The Director of Breed Improvement advertisements are currently running in national and regional publications throughout the U.S., as well as digitally on select online platforms.

The second advertisement will make its debut this summer during feeder-calf sale season. It is named "Head of the Class," as Angus and Angus-influenced feeder calves consistently find themselves at the top of the chart when it comes to sale averages and carcass quality. According to the 2016 Here's the Premium study conducted by Certified Angus Beef LLC, Angus steers and heifers bring an average of almost \$25 more per head than their non-Angus competitors.

When producers market Angussired calves, there is documented value from that transaction. The Association's commercial programs, AngusSource® and Angus LinkSM, are designed to help commercial producers find the extra value.

The third advertisement focuses on the maternal side of the Angus business, highlighting the Angus cow and her maternal strengths.

Named the "Most Valuable Player," she provides unparalleled maternal instincts and is adaptable to nearly any region. The "Most Valuable Player" ads will be placed strategically in publications and online during the fall calving season.

Losing Ground airs May 25

Losing Ground, an I Am Angus film, is the first and only film to explore the effect of urbanization on rural America. The one-hour film will feature research from the American Farmland Trust and the stories of five diverse operations. These operations, from four different areas of the country, face the struggle of a growing urban center every day.

- P refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

XF - Free of more than one genetic condition.

XC - Carrier of more than one genetic condition.

XA - Affected of more than one genetic condition.

RTF - Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).

Scholarship apps due

The Angus Foundation will award a number of undergraduate and graduate scholarships this year. Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the 2019 NJAS in Louisville, Ky.

Eligibility requirements for the general Angus Foundation scholarships remain the same. Angus youth who are graduating from high school or in college currently may also be eligible for other Angus-related scholarships that are permanently endowed and managed by the Angus Foundation.

The Foundation will make graduate student scholarships available to young men and women actively involved in the Angus breed who are pursuing advanced degrees.

Applicants must have at one time been a NJAA member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the Association. Strong preference and priority will be given to applicants pursuing advanced degrees related to the beef industry.

The Angus Foundation undergraduate and graduate student scholarship application and guidelines are available at www.angusfoundation.org. The application deadline is May 1.

Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB)/ NJAA scholarship applications are also due May 1 and require a separate application (available on website).

Applicants should carefully read and follow the scholarship guidelines and requirements their application

must meet to be determined eligible for consideration. Applying is no guarantee of receiving a scholarship.

Auxiliary scholarships

The American Angus Auxiliary annually awards scholarships to graduating high school seniors. The postmark deadline for the national contest is May 1.

Junior Angus members must first be chosen as a state auxiliary scholarship winner before advancing to the national competition.

Affiliate scholarship

The Angus Foundation will provide \$1,000 scholarships to three youth who use Angus genetics in their seedstock or commercial operations. Awards will be distributed this July.
