AHIR deadline is May 30

May 30 is the deadline for submitting Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) data for inclusion in the next National Cattle Evaluation (NCE), which generates data for the fall 2003 Sire Evaluation Report. It's important to your individual herd and to the Angus breed to collect and submit performance records promptly. If you have questions, contact the Performance Programs Department at (816) 383-5100.

Nominate delegates now

You only have a few weeks left to nominate delegates to represent your state at the 2003 American Angus Association Annual Meeting, set for Monday, Nov. 17, in Louisville, Kv.

Each active Association member should have received a nomination petition in the mail and may nominate one member. All eligible nominations from each state will be included on that state's ballot, which will be mailed to members later this summer for the final selection of delegates. Nominations

must be postmarked by June 30 to be included on the final ballot.

It's important to nominate a person from your state who is willing to attend the Annual Meeting and who is informed about the Angus business. In some cases, that person could be you, so don't hesitate to nominate vourself.

If you're a new member, make plans to attend the Annual Meeting to learn more about the business of your Association. The event takes place during the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE), which is the site of one of the five Angus Roll of Victory (ROV) super-point shows.

Online entries are subject to the same entry deadlines as those submitted via the mail, so don't let time slip away from you. As always, no late entries are accepted for any reason.

LEAD Conference planned for Fort Worth

Developing personal leadership skills is one of the most valuable benefits of being a National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) member. One event that allows members to do just that is the annual NJAA Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) Conference set for July 31-Aug. 3 in Fort Worth, Texas.

Juniors ages 14 and older are eligible to participate. This year's theme is "Discover Your Worth in Fort Worth." Juniors will have the opportunity to make new Angus friends, learn about current beef industry issues and explore the unique Fort Worth area.

Registration materials can be found in the entry booklet that was distributed to all active juniors earlier in the year. Request materials by contacting the Junior Activities Department, or go to www.njaa.info. Registration is \$175 for juniors and \$150 for advisors until June 15, the early registration deadline. After that date, registration will be \$200 for juniors and \$175 for advisors.

National Angus Conference coming in fall

In just a few short months breeders will make their way to the 2003 National Angus Conference and Tour, set for Sept. 24-27 in Mandan, N.D. A program of top beef industry speakers will highlight the one-day conference, and the North Dakota Angus Association (NDAA) will host a two-day tour that will feature Angus herds across the state.

Junior exhibitors who plan to participate in both events need to submit separate entries for both shows and need to check in with both shows once they arrive in Louisville.

Need help with junior transfers?

Juniors who have not received the transfer

paper on a purchased animal should contact the Association at least two weeks prior to the ownership deadline of a particular show. The staff will make every attempt to get the animal transferred on time. Keep in mind that late transfers for shows are never accepted. Please contact the Association before it's too late.

A summer full of junior Angus activities is first preceded by many deadlines for show entries, contests and awards. Make note of the dates and deadlines provided on page 54 of "Next Generation," as no late entries are accepted for any reason.
