William Parchman, 83, died June 10 at his farm in Ross Township, Ohio.

Parchman graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1942 and received a degree in meteorology from Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 1943. He was a meteorologist with the 8th Air Force in England during World War II.

After the war, he graduated from the Salmon P. Chase College of Law and was admitted to the bar in 1949. He married Josephine Ector in 1943. She died in 1974.

Parchman cofounded Parchman & Oyler Realtors (P&O) with Clark Oyler in 1949. He also owned Kiata Farms Inc. and raised Angus cattle that won many show awards. Kiata has been recognized as one of the leading Angus operations in Ohio.

Parchman was a member of the Miami Valley Angus Association and the Ohio Angus Association. He also held several memberships and leadership positions with organizations in Cincinnati.
