New scholarship offered for KILE junior beef exhibitors

A new scholarship, with an application deadline of June 1, is available for junior beef exhibitors of the Keystone International Livestock Exposition (KILE). The KILE Beef Committee is offering two scholarships to college students, one for \$1,000 and one for \$500.

More than 200 junior beef exhibitors participate at KILE annually. The new scholarship was created to recognize their commitment and to provide financial assistance for obtaining a college education. A percentage of the funds raised from the Youth Beef Benefit Auction at the 2006 KILE has been dedicated to the Junior Beef Exhibitor Scholarship Fund.

This year's recipients will be recognized Friday, Oct. 5, at the KILE Youth Beef Benefit Auction at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex & Expo Center, Harrisburg, Pa.

To qualify for this scholarship, applicants must have exhibited beef cattle in the Junior Beef Show at KILE for at least one year since 2004. Applicants must be enrolled in a degree or certification program at a post-secondary educational institution (college, university, or trade or technical school). Awards will be based on academics, community leadership, agricultural activities and KILE involvement.

CSU provides Camp Round-UP

Colorado State University's (CSU's) College of Agriculture is offering youth 14 to 18 years old the opportunity to learn about food-animal agriculture and equine

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sciences at this summer's Camp Round-UP.

The program invites students from both urban and agricultural backgrounds to learn about animal agriculture through hands-on activities. Students will use science- and math-based activities with livestock, take tours of state-of-the-art facilities and listen to presentations by CSU faculty and graduate students.

The course curriculum focuses on incorporating science, math and agriculture into an environment that fosters teamwork. Lessons will cover animal agriculture industries, including equine, beef, dairy, sheep and wool, swine, poultry, and meat sciences.

Junior Angus members intending to enter this year's photo contest should make sure entries are in the mail by May 15.

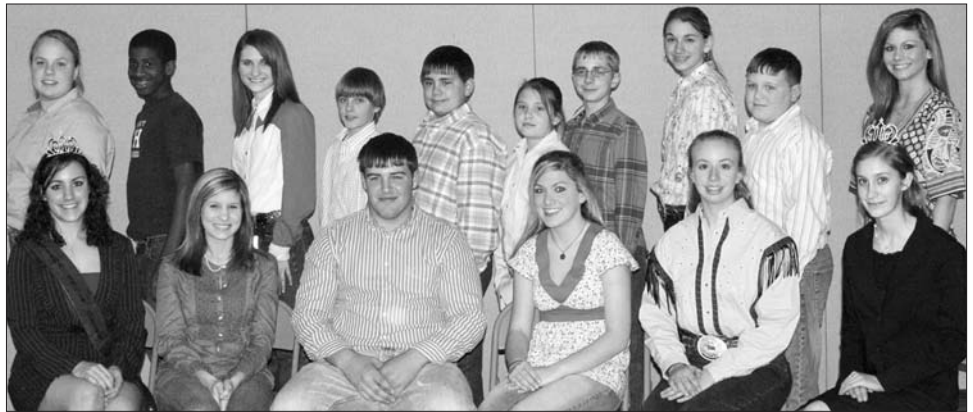

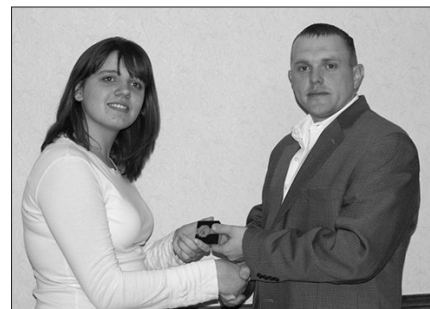

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NJAA members earn Bronze and Silver

The Bronze and Silver awards are the first two levels of the National Junior Recognition Program (NJRP), which the American Angus Association began in 1972. To receive these honors, junior Angus members must apply for the awards and meet point requirements in many areas of participation.

Applicants are evaluated in the areas of junior Angus association activities, participation in showmanship and leadership events, use of performance testing to improve their herds, and progress in producing and merchandising Angus cattle.

While the Bronze and Silver awards are presented to members throughout the year, Angus Productions, Inc. (API) publishes summaries of the award winners in the May and September youth-focused issues of the *Angus Journal*.
