Rocky Creek Farms, Ashford, Ala., has received the Historic Herd Award from the American Angus Association. William Womack Sr. established the herd in 1941 with the purchase of four cows and one bull. In the 1950s the introduction of Bahai grass and the inception of performance testing became incentives for the Womacks to put more emphasis on raising Angus cattle.

William Jr., "Billy," returned to the farm in 1964 after earning his degree at Auburn University. He now owns and manages the farm. Throughout the years, the Womack family has been progressive in performance testing and recordkeeping.

The Association presents the Historic Angus Herd Award to Angus herds that have been in the continuous production of registered Angus cattle by the same family for 50 years or more.

John Crouch, Saint Joseph, Mo., American Angus Association executive vice president, was recently honored with an appreciation dinner at the Wendell Alexander farm in Dresden, Tenn. Crouch is a Tennessee native and a graduate of the University of Tennessee (UT) in Knoxville.

IN PASSING

Renos Long, Morgantown, Ind., died March 27, two weeks prior to his 100th birthday.

Renos was born April 10, 1907, in Owen County in Indiana. He spent his entire life as a cattleman and farmer in Johnson and Morgan counties. A lifetime member of the American Angus Association since 1953, four generations of his family have now been active Angus breeders. Renos enjoyed helping 4-H and junior breeders get their start in the Angus business.

He is survived by his son, Ronald; two grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Jack Halverson, 82, Forest River, N.D., died April 25 at the Valley Memorial Home, Woodside Village, Grand Forks, N.D.

Jack was born Aug. 25, 1924, in Grand Forks to A.E. and Mildred (Poole) Halverson. He graduated from high school in Forest River and attended the University of North Dakota (UND). Jack enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps, serving from 1943 to 1945. Following his discharge he continued his education at the Minnesota School of Business, graduating in 1948.

Jack then returned to Forest River to farm with his father. He married Phyllis Stoll May 28, 1948, in Grand Forks. Jack was the founding president of Black Gold Farms, served as president of the North Dakota Angus Association and represented the livestock industry throughout the U.S. He was active in the Red River Valley Potato Growers Association as well as the Presidents

Ag Club at North Dakota State University (NDSU).

Jack was also a member of the Forest River Community Church, the Forest River City Council, the Forest River American Legion and the Grand Forks Elks Club. He played alto saxophone in many bands, starting with jazz bands while attending UND. He was a member of the Elks Band from its inception, as well as the 9th District Legion Band, the Shrine Band and the Grand Forks Community Band. Jack was also a member of Saint John's Masonic Lodge of Forest River, the Kem Temple Shrine of Grand Forks and the Shrine Band, the Royal Order of Jesters and the Experimental Aircraft Association.

Jack is survived by a son, Gregg; a daughter, Margo; five grandchildren; three step-grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Alex Davis, 84, Council Hill, Okla., died April 8 in Muskogee, Okla.

Alex was born Aug. 18, 1922, in Scipio, Okla., to Luther and Rose (Perkins) Davis. He married Eugenia Beck Feb. 14, 1942, in Eufala, Okla. He farmed in Oklahoma and later moved to California, where he worked in a frozen fruit plant.

Alex moved back to Oklahoma in 1950, residing in Russellville. In 1959 he moved to Council Hill, where he started Circle D Angus Farm. Alex was a life member of the American Angus Association and many state and local cattlemen's associations.

He was a member of the Elm Grove Baptist Church and received numerous awards for helping 4-H, FFA and the Methodist Boys Home.

Alex is survived by his wife; sons, Keith and Bryan; daughters, Vickie and Susan; 11 grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.
