Branganmere, Marshfield, Mo., has received the American Angus Association Historic Herd Award. Bob and Zetta Brangan purchased their foundation cattle from W.H. Barker, Fair Play, Mo., and M.E. and H.W. Harrison, Mountain Grove, Mo. The Brangans joined the Association in April 1954. They were active on the farm until their deaths.

Their daughter, Roberta, showed Angus as a 4-H project. She and her husband, Kenneth Smith, moved back to the farm in 1972 and today manage a cow herd of more than 50 head. Their two children, Robert and Regina, and families, are active on the farm.

The Association presents the Historic Angus Herd Award to Angus herds that have been in the continuous production of registered Angus cattle by the same family for 50 years or more.

Lakeview Farm, New Hebron, Miss., has received the Historic Angus Herd Award. Stanley Garner established Lakeview Farm in the early 1930s as a cotton farm and commercial cattle operation. Stanley's son, Carl, realized the potential of Angus cattle, and in 1958 the first two females were purchased for \$200 each from Charles Klassen, Collins, Miss. Several herd bulls were purchased from Burch Angus Ranch, Mill Creek, Okla. Beginning in the 1970s, artificial insemination (AI) was utilized. Most of the cattle are sold through private treaty.

Today, Richard Garner uses Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®) and ultrasound data to expand the 80-cow herd. Richard, along with his wife, Misty, now own and operate Lakeview Farm.

Richard's grandfather started his herd with the gift of two Angus cows in 1972. Richard showed cattle for 10 years through the local 4-H program and was a member of his collegiate livestock judging teams. He currently serves as president of the Lawrence County Cattlemen's Association and has served in numerous leadership roles in the Middle Mississippi and Mississippi Angus associations.

Roland Anderjaska, Hayes Center, Neb., has received the American Angus Association Historic Herd Award. Roland and his wife, Marilyn, were presented with the award at a family celebration honoring their 50th wedding anniversary.

The registered Angus cow herd was established by Roland in 1956. His father had already been using registered Angus bulls for more than 20 years. In 1958, he joined the Association. Roland paid \$325 for his first two females purchased from Eli Votaw Jr., Wellfleet, Neb. They were productive cows for 15 years, and one of them mothered a set of twin heifer calves that became the foundation for the herd known as Marandy.

Over the years, the Anderjaska's utilized AI and embryo transfer (ET). They sell bulls privately and through consignment sales as well as enter some in bull test sales. Replacement heifers have been sold in nine states. They have even exported cattle to Japan with help from their oldest son, Jon.

Roland and Marilyn retired in 1999, but still retain some cows. Their youngest son, Joe, now manages the ranch under the name Rocking Lazy J Angus.

Terre Haute Farms, Ville Platte, La., has received the Historic Angus Herd Award. John Mire purchased his first Angus, a bred cow with a calf at side, from Elton Angus Farm, Elton, La., for \$350 in 1958.

John's interest in the breed was sparked by a college professor, L.H. Tease, and confirmed with regular correspondence from Otto Battles, Rosemere Farms, Maquoketa, Iowa, and Los Olivos, Calif. John became a lifetime member of the American Angus Association in August 1962. Terre Haute Farms' foundation cattle were purchased from Pine Hill Angus, Roseneath, Pine Tree and Louisiana Angus Associationsponsored sales.

After graduation from the University of Louisiana, John took a job with Swift & Co., then went to work for the Louisiana State University Ag Center as a parish agent while earning a master's degree. He retired as a parish agent after 28 years of service. An active member of the cattle industry, he served as secretary for the Evangeline Parish Cattlemen's Association for 24 years.

In March 2006, his son, Garrett, became a partner in Terre Haute Farms, and his grandsons have shown Angus for three years. Jon Means, Van Horn, Texas, was re-elected president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) at the organization's annual convention in Corpus Christi.
