

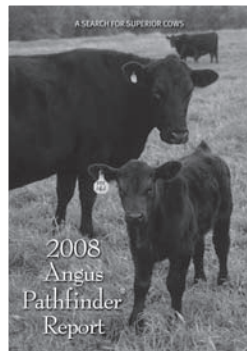

Pathfinder® Report Available

The 2008 *Pathfinder® Report* is in the April issue of the *Angus Journal*. This year's report lists 9,917 individual cows and 273



sires that qualify for Pathfinder status. You can also review and search the Pathfinder Report online at www.angus.org/performance.

The Pathfinder program was started in 1978 and

identifies superior Angus females based upon recorded performance traits that are

economically important to efficient beef production and include early and regular calving, as well as heavy weaning weights. Bulls that have sired a minimum of five or more Pathfinder cows are listed as Pathfinder sires in this report.

Delegate petitions will arrive soon

Preparation for the 2008 Annual Convention of Delegates, set for this November in Louisville, Ky., is already under way. In late March, delegate nomination forms were mailed to all active life and regular members.

The nomination period runs from April 1 through June 30. Each membership is allowed to nominate one eligible member who resides in the same state or district. Active members may nominate any one member from their state, including themselves. The candidate should be actively involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Nominations must be received in the Association office no later than June 30, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to the membership in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition, send it in right away.

When the nomination form arrives, don't set it aside and forget it. Fill it out and return it as soon as possible.

Details of the election process can be found in Article III of the Association's *Breeder's Reference Guide*, which was distributed in the mailing box with the March issue of the *Angus Journal*.

your commercial bull buyers. A properly registered and transferred bull is required for your customers to enroll in the AngusSource program. When it is time to mail the transferred registration papers, be sure to include the AngusSource transfer insert that provides your customers with information about AngusSource, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Process Verified Program (PVP) that documents source, age and 50% Angus genetics. These inserts are available at no cost by calling AngusSource at 816-383-5100.

Association launches Producer Priority Finder

The American Angus Association has created an online tool to help commercial cow-calf producers identify the most important management priorities for their individual operations. This interactive tool allows producers to assess where they are the strongest and weakest in their management strategies to determine where they should

place their management priorities in order to increase profitability in their cow herd.

"We realize that there are so many management areas that affect profitability on the ranch," says Ty Groshans, Association director of commercial programs. Some management areas, such as labor and herd health, producers can control; others, such as the climate and the economy, are somewhat out of their reach.

"The Producer Priority Finder allows producers to look at 15 management practices to evaluate where they might need to place more emphasis to make their operation more profitable," Groshans explains.

The Producer Priority Finder is an online tool that allows producers to rank on a scale of 1 to 5 their strongest and weakest areas of 15 management categories, based on the results of a 2006 study conducted by Tom Field, *Priorities First: Identifying Management Priorities in the Commercial Cow-Calf Business*. Once a producer ranks the management strategies, the Priority Finder results reveal the five areas of greatest weakness, where the producer should place more emphasis on his or her operation.

"Cow-calf producers are overwhelmed by their workload along with the massive volumes of available information and advice on individual aspects of their business. We hope producers find this tool useful in staying profitable," Groshans says.

Texas Challenge II later this month

Klaus and Bonnie Birkel, owners of Camp Cooley Ranch, Franklin, Texas, are encouraging Texas Angus breeders and the Texas Angus Association to raise funds to support Angus education, youth and research efforts through the Angus Foundation. Camp Cooley Ranch will host and underwrite the Texas Challenge II, a celebration at the ranch on Saturday, April 26, at 5:30 p.m. featuring a CAB dinner and live entertainment. All Texas Angus breeders and supporters are invited to attend.

In January 2007, the Birkels pledged \$250,000 toward the Angus Foundation's ambitious Vision of Value: Campaign for Angus goal to raise \$11 million by Dec. 31, 2011, if Texas Angus breeders and the Texas Angus Association raised \$250,000 in matching funds at \$50,000 per year the next five years.

After the overwhelming success of last year's event, the goal has been increased to \$1 million with Texas Angus breeders challenged to raise another \$500,000. By hosting The Texas Challenge II, the Birkels are again showing their dedication and commitment to furthering the success of the Angus breed.
