## Look for delegate petitions in the mail

Preparations are already being made for the 2008 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Louisville, Ky. The first step of the delegate election process will take place this month when forms to nominate delegates to the Annual Meeting will be mailed to every active life and regular Association member during the last week of March.

The nomination period runs from April 1 through June 30. Each member is allowed to nominate one eligible member who resides in the same state or district. Active members may nominate any one member from their state, including themselves. The candidate should be actively involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Nominations must be received in the Association office no later than June 30, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to the membership in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition, send it in right away.

## Report new Association, Auxiliary officers

All local, state and regional Angus associations need to submit their new officer listings to the Communications Department by May 1. This will ensure correct listings are included on the Association web site and in the *2007 Resource Edition*, published as an insert in the August 2008 *Angus Journal*. Listings will include association name, current officers, addresses, phone numbers and web site, if applicable. International letters are designated for each year of birth for livestock identification (ID). These designated letters are an easy option to use in conjunction with numbers when permanently identifying animals.
