

Activities planned for 101st National Western

Five days of Angus events - including a 2007 super-point Roll of Victory (ROV) Angus Show, a junior heifer show, pen and carload shows, and the National Western Angus Bull Sale — are planned during the 101st National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo.

The activities begin with the junior heifer show at 2 p.m., Tuesday, Jan. 9, in the Stadium Arena. Bruce Kiesewetter, Letts, Iowa, will evaluate the juniors' Angus females.

The female portion of the super-point ROV Angus Show will begin at 8 a.m., Wednesday, Jan. 10, in the Stadium Arena. The ROV bull show will resume on Friday, Jan. 12, at 8 a.m. Jim Pipkin, Republic, Mo., will evaluate the cattle.

The National Western Angus Bull Sale highlights events Thursday, Jan. 11. The bull sale show begins at 9 a.m. in the Stadium Arena. Five judges will evaluate the 76 bulls and select division, grand and reserve grand champions. Judges include Brian Barragree, Absarokee, Mont.; Mike Jones, Folsom, La.; Greg McCurry, Sedgwick, Kan.; Doug Parrett, Urbana, Ill.; and Matt Perrier, Eureka, Kan. The sale begins at 2 p.m. in the Beef Palace Auction Arena, and will be broadcast via the internet at www.liveauctions.com. The sale of the 2007 Angus Foundation Heifer Package will precede the bull sale.

The Angus Reception, beginning at 6:30 p.m., will complete Thursday's activities. A change of venue this year, the reception will be at the Denver Center for Performing Arts. Transportation will be provided from the Marriott City Center Hotel.

The sale of the package will precede the 2007 National Western Angus Bull Sale, set for 2 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 11 in the Beef Palace Auction Arena at the National Western Complex.

- ► 30 days of free insurance from American Live Stock Insurance Co., Geneva, Ill.;
- ► free transportation to the buyer's farm or ranch provided by Lathrop Livestock Transportation, Dundee, Ill.; and
- ► a flush and three embryo implants into the buyer's recipient cows from Trans Ova Genetics, Sioux Center, Iowa.

Spring Sire Evaluation now available online

The spring 2007 Sire Evaluation Report is now available on the internet at *www.angus.org.* Accessing the report online is the fastest and easiest way to get the latest performance information on sires in the Angus breed. It allows you to specify ranges of expected progeny differences (EPDs) and to sort bulls that qualify in those ranges.

Printed copies of the *Sire Evaluation Report* will be available at the NWSS. In addition, active members who returned their blue request cards to receive a printed copy of the Fall 2006 report will receive the spring 2007 report automatically.
