Entry rules are:

1. Only individuals may submit entries; one entry per person.
2. Entries may be computer generated or may be hand-drawn.
3. Entry must be submitted on paper no larger than 8½ inches × 11 inches.
4. Entry must contain both a logo and slogan.
5. Include name, complete mailing address, phone number and/or e-mail address, and date of birth on the back of the entry.
6. Entries must be postmarked by March 1, 2008.

The winner will be recognized in the 2010 NJAS program, be introduced at opening ceremonies and will receive a one-of-a-kind custom-made jacket with the logo and slogan.
