the 2006 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Louisville, Ky. The annual

business meeting will take place in conjunction with the North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE).

The first step of the delegate election process will take place this month with the mailing of nomination petitions to every active Association member. Members can use the petitions to nominate state delegates for the 2006 Annual Convention. Active members may nominate one member,

including themselves, from their state. The candidate should be actively involved in the

Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Nominations must be received in the Association office no later than June 30, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to the membership in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition this month, send it in right away.

#### **Cattlemen's Boot Camps set**

The Association and the Angus Foundation are pleased to announce they will be conducting boot camps in conjunction with two universities. The first camp is set for April 28-29 at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, Calif. The second camp is set for Aug. 29-30 at the University of Illinois in Urbana.

In an effort to further educate producers about the beef industry, these sessions are designed for smaller groups to see and hear about production, management and marketing.

An Angus Skills Lab, open to a limited number of newer Angus producers, will take place as well. The lab offers producers handson training for artificial insemination (AI), freeze-branding, tattooing and other management practices.

#### **Affiliates receive EPD updates**

Several weeks ago, Angus affiliates individuals who are not members of the Association, but who have recently purchased and received the ownership transfer of a registered Angus bull received updated expected progeny differences (EPDs) on all active bulls currently in their ownership. This service is one of the benefits affiliates receive when their Angus seedstock supplier transfers the ownership of a bull into their name.

More than 36,000 updates were sent to affiliates nationwide. This service is offered on an annual basis following the release of National Cattle Evaluation (NCE) data in December. The update includes the bull's name, birth date and all EPDs available. In addition, a letter from the Association



accompanies the update, thanking producers for their purchase of Angus bulls and outlining commercial services provided by the Association.

Mailing EPD updates increases the service to commercial users of registered Angus genetics and increases the value of these bulls' properly transferred registration certificates. Special thanks to Intervet, the corporate partner for this project.
