beef and dairy producers better understand how beef checkoff dollars are spent. The Beefmobiles visit more than 250 livestock marketing facilities and beef events and 10 consumer venues,

reaching out to producers to provide information and to solicit input about the checkoff program.

Dale and his wife owned Feltman Angus Farm in Hartwell. He was a member of the American Angus Association and the Georgia Angus Association.

Dale is survived by his wife, Eleanor; son, Kevin; daughters, Dona and Tara; and a sister and a brother.

Kenneth (Kenny) Reeser, 74, LeRoy, Ill., died Dec. 8, 2006, at OSF Saint Joseph Medical Center, Bloomington, Ill.

Kenny was born Oct. 14, 1932, in Danvers, Ill., to Jake and Lorene (Stahly) Reeser. He married Anna Mae "Maisie" Beasley in November 1958.

A life member of the American Angus Association, he had raised Angus cattle since childhood, eventually having one of the largest cattle herds in Illinois. Kenny experienced numerous achievements with his herd, including a national champion, "Charger," in 1964.

Rachel was born Jan. 21, 1908, in New York City, N.Y., to John Henry Hammond and Emily Sloane Vanderbilt. She was a graduate of Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Conn. As a teenager, Rachel started working for the Professional Children's School in New York, becoming a member of the school's board at 19. She served in that capacity for 36 years and was president during her last four years on the board.

Rachel owned and operated Hedgerows Farm in West Cornwall, Conn. She became a member of the American Angus Association in the early 1950s, served as president of the Connecticut Angus Association and the New England Angus Association, and was a delegate to the Association annual meeting for nearly 25 years. In 1980, Rachel was the first woman to seek a position on the American Angus Association Board of Directors.

She was also actively involved with the Eastern States Angus Association, the Eastern National Livestock Show and Eastern States Expo. She had the grand champion female at the 1976 National Western Stock Show (NWSS), and served as an Angus ambassador while traveling to



foreign countries on goodwill and public relations tours. Rachel dispersed the Hedgerows cattle in 1983, but still attended Angus events into her 90s. In 1990, she was selected for induction into the Angus Heritage Foundation, with the caption above her photo reading "First Lady of Angus Industry."

Andy Angus, originally created by Rachel from a battered teddy bear purchased at a Salvation Army store in New York City in 1955 or 1956 to promote the Connecticut Angus Sale, presided over the Angus Auxiliary's 40th Anniversary celebration in Louisville, Ky., and is now on permanent display at the American Angus Association office in Saint Joseph, Mo. In 2001, at 93, she created an original crewel picture in honor of the 50th anniversary of the Auxiliary, which was auctioned to benefit the Auxiliary scholarship fund.

Rachel is survived by her daughter, Leith; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Veryl Lee Jones, 85, Calhoun, Mo., died Friday, Jan. 5, at Saint Luke's Hospital, Kansas City, Mo.

Veryl was born Aug. 31, 1919, in Calhoun, Mo., to Robert Lee Jones and Maude (Dannatt) Jones. He graduated from Calhoun High School in 1937 as a star member of the basketball team. Veryl worked on the farm with his father and brothers until enlisting in the U.S. Army, where he served for 39 months and was honorably discharged as a second lieutenant
