In January, I attended the funeral of Sharee's father, Bob Laflin, in Kansas. It is never easy to lose someone so ingrained in the Angus business, but losing someone who has a larger-than-life personality seems even more unsettling. Bob was not only a huge Angus supporter, he was a great Auxiliary cheerleader, and he will be missed.

Tom Burke rendered an Angus eulogy that celebrated Bob's efforts, which would rival almost any other family's involvement in the breed. He did not call Bob a cattleman, but rather, an Angus man.
