Zodiac Angus, Adrian, Mo., was presented with the American Angus Association Historic Angus Herd Award — an honor given to Angus herds that have continually produced registered Angus cattle, by the same family, for 50 years or more. Owner Harley Ford established the herd with cattle from Silver Top Farms, Belton, Mo., and Penny and James and Homeplace Farms, both of Hamilton, Mo. Ford continues to operate the herd, which includes about 50 registered Angus cows.

J Bar Angus, Columbus, Neb., has received the Historic Angus Herd Award for maintaining its herd for more than 50 years. James Cumming owns the 45-head registered herd. It was founded in 1953 with the purchase of a show female in Lincoln, Neb.
