It is very comforting to be under someone else's umbrella for a first experience. And, believe me, as I brooded over the sale-day forecast of torrential thunderstorms, I was glad to take shelter from my anxious thoughts with friends who have done this sort of thing many times. But still, what if my females didn't pull their weight? What if the "support position" where they were placed in the sale order just didn't hold up? What if? What if? What if?

When the day before the sale finally arrived, my husband and I attended the neighboring Angus auction first before we headed to the ranch where my cattle were displayed. I gained a little confidence when a few friends asked about my lots in the next day's auction. Talking about my cattle and what they can offer was not only easy, it also helped remind me of their worth to me. Each of them had played an important role in building the breeding program I'd set my sights on so many years ago. I was proud to tell everything I knew — and I mean everything! (Fred finally pulled me away when he noticed that eyes were glazing over as I covered every detail of every sale lot.)

#### A whack on the side of the head

As we drove away from that sale, I began to realize that weeks of idle worry and unfounded fears about my cows' readiness had kept me from addressing what had really been looming in the back of my mind. It hit me that there were two very human questions at the root of every one of my bovine ones: Am I really ready to let these females go? Will the new owners give them the care that I have?

When I mentioned my revelation to Fred, he shrugged and in his matter-of-fact manner said, "If you want to get the most from what you've put into your cows, the

price you have to pay is to let them go." Deep down that is what I wanted, but why had I struggled so much to uncover it? It was then that I remembered the second sentence of Carnegie's quote, "The surething boat never gets far from the shore."

After Fred parked the truck, he set out in the opposite direction as I wandered toward my cattle pen. I made my way down the aisle and found myself hoping I would have the courage just to follow through with this whole ordeal.

Then I felt a tiny ray of sunshine pass through the clouds. I looked up and a really good Angus breeder I know was standing at my gate. He opened it for me to pass through saying, "Shirley, I'm coming back in to take another look at your cows. Man, they're good. Tell me about them!"

I truly love talking about cattle, almost as much as I love caring for them, planning for them, hoping for them and yes, Fred, even paying for them! When I expounded on the good points of each individual and everything she'd done to get me on my way in this business, the message finally got through — to me.

It was time for these cows to contribute to someone else's program exactly what they'd given to mine — and more.

Selling the females that got me started means it is time for me to move on to new genetics that will bring new lessons and new challenges. I must believe that in different environments, under different management and with different goals, my cows will prove their worth all over again in ways that fit each owner's idea of what matters and what works.

This daring sale experience delivered my answer to those two human questions. Letting my cattle go doesn't mean I have to stop being proud of what we accomplished together because caring and giving your best creates a special stewardship that never has to end. Now, I'll just be checking cows from the other side of the fence.

When you decide to do anything, you must be willing to row away from what you know toward new waters yet to be explored. And, later, though you're not still at the helm, trust that what you always cared about will be taken by someone else to new places you may never have dared to go. Bon voyage!
