Angus Optimal Milk Module

The American Angus Association recently released the Angus Optimal Milk Module. The first of its kind, this is an online educational module designed for commercial cow-calf producers. The module is directed at the use of targeted Angus milk expected progeny differences (EPDs). It is simple to use and relates the result of milk genetics to a producer's net income per cow. Once producers understand how much milk is optimal for their operations, they can readily select Angus bulls with the right milk EPDs to match their needs.

The Angus Optimal Milk Module allows producers to think through the "what ifs" in their cow herds. For example, higher-milk cows bring about higher weaning production levels and weaned calf income potential, but these cows also carry greater risk in times of limited feed availability (such as a drought) due to their higher nutritional requirements.

AIMS 2.4 introduced

The newest version of Angus Information Management Software (AIMS) is available and features several enhancements. One of the most significant changes to AIMS version 2.4 is the addition of fields, including fields for calving ease EPDs, Weaned Calf Value (\$W) and Cow Energy Value (\$EN). Also added were fields for permanent mark method, foster dam information and temperament. A number of new fields relate to the convergence of Beef Record Service (BRS) records with Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR), which will potentially allow producers submitting BRS data to do so via the AIMS program.

An enhancement to the customer manager screen is the "Primary/Transfer Name." Rather than having to designate a first and last name or ranch name of the buyer, a primary name field has been added to make the transfers more accurate.
