IN PASSING

Robert "Bob" Hillier, 64, Stillwater, Okla., died April 13 at his home.

Bob was born Jan. 20, 1941, to J.C. and Louella Hillier. He graduated from Stillwater High School in 1959 and received a bachelor's degree in animal science from OSU in 1963. He attended Purdue University and earned a master's degree and doctorate in ruminant nutrition.

In 1963 he married Lynda Park of Tulsa, Okla. Upon graduating from Purdue, Bob worked for Ralston Purina Co., Saint Louis, Mo., where he developed a preconditioning/ receiving formula and wrote the first *Purina Beef Cattle Facts Book*. He also developed self-limiting supplement formulas such as Accuration[®] and Accuration Grass Stretcher, as well as other cattle supplements while at Purina.

In the 1970s, Bob served as vice president and general manager of Deaf Smith Feedyard Inc., Hereford, Texas; general manager of Hitch Feeders II, Garden City, Kan.; and, later, general manager of Hitch Feeders I in Guymon, Okla. While at Hitch, he helped develop the Hitch Verified Production Control program. In 1973, he established H&H Cattle Co., a registered Angus herd known today as Hillier Angus Ranch and charter member of OBI. He became president of Bartlett Cattle Co. in 1989. By 1994, he completed some consulting work, and, in 1995, became the vice president of cattle procurement for ConAgra. He returned to Stillwater in 1997 and remained active in the cattle industry.

Bob served on the board of the American Angus Association, Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association, North East Oklahoma Angus Association, Kansas Livestock Association, Texas Cattlemen's Association, Colorado Cattlemen's Association, and as chairman of the Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) Board.

He is survived by his wife; daughter Susan; son Robert Brian; and three grandchildren.

Flora Felton, 70, Neola, Iowa, died March 21 at her home.

Flora was born Aug. 23, 1934, to Carl and Della Schnackel Hildebrandt. She graduated from Shelby High School and worked for the U.S. Postal Service in Omaha, Iowa, for 20 years. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and its Evening Circle. She spent many years active in 4-H and Farm Bureau.

Survivors include her husband, Don; sons Randy, Roger and Rick; daughter Cindi; four grandchildren; and four greatgrandchildren.

A.F. "Frankie" Flint Sr., 96, Tucumcari, N.M., died April 9 at his residence.

Frankie was born on the family farm near Bard, N.M., on May 17, 1908, to Martenia and Edna (Marrs) Flint. He married Addie Lee Whately in 1930. He traveled and volunteered for organizations such as the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF), Production Registry International, American Angus Association, New Mexico and Texas Angus associations, Certified Meat Sires, and New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association.

He served on the San Jon school board for 25 years and was a Rural Electric Association board member for 45 years. Frankie was a lifetime resident of the Bard community until his move to Tucumcari five years ago. He was a member of the San Jon United Methodist Church.
