Free electronic certificate conversion available

In 2004, an electronic method to submit applications for transfers of registration was implemented by the American Angus Association. Registration certificates that are electronically stored can be electronically transferred through AAA Login and Angus Information Management Software (AIMS).

Conversion of printed registration certificates to electronic storage generally costs \$2, but for a limited time the Association is offering a free conversion period. Members wishing to convert

registration papers to electronic storage should send the papers to the Association between June 1 and Sept. 1, 2005.

Although electronic storage can be an efficient way to manage cattle within your herd, anyone exhibiting cattle at an Association-sponsored show must still carry the original registration paper with them.

Association offers RFID tag option

The Association has introduced two radio frequency identification (RFID) tag options for cattle producers. Any producer wanting to take advantage of the efficiency available with RFID tags can use the Beef Improvement Records (BIR) tag, available in RFID matched-pair sets and RFID tagonly options.

All RFID tags available through the Association are high-quality Allflex halfduplex RFID tags. The number

"burned" into the RFID is printed on the outside of the RFID tag. The BIR logo is printed on the RFID male piece.

Producers may order a matched pair, which includes the RFID tag and a visual tag. The BIR visual tag is yellow in color and comes

stamped with the BIR logo, a 15digit unique animal number that matches the RFID tag and customized management codes chosen by the producer.

The RFID tags are available for \$2.25 each, with a minimum order of 20. RFID-matched-pair sets are \$3.25 each, with a minimum order of 20.

Junior deadlines for American Royal, North American

The ownership deadline is Aug. 1 for the Angus junior shows at the American Royal in Kansas City, Mo., and at the NAILE in Louisville, Ky. The junior exhibitor must be the sole owner of the animal by Aug. 1, as listed on the certificate. To be eligible to show, issue dates on the certificates must be Aug. 1 or earlier.

The entry deadline for the American Royal has changed to Sept. 1. All cattle for both junior and open shows at the American Royal have to be in place at the same designated time. Junior cattle do not have a later arrival as in past years. Cattle entered in the junior show only will still be released at the conclusion of the junior show.

The NAILE entry deadline is Oct. 1. No late entries for either show will be accepted.
