Premium Carcasses

Angus juniors win big in NJAS carcass steer contest.

oping to gain a real-world perspective, junior Angus exhibitors from across the country entered steers into the carcass contest at the 2003 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), July 13-19 in Louisville, Ky.

The contest was created in 1985 in an effort to increase awareness of the role Angus cattle play outside the showring.

After being discontinued in 1991, the contest was reinstated in 1993. This year more than 30 contestants took part in the competition.

Prize money is an obvious incentive to participate: \$1,000 is awarded for the firstplace carcass steer; \$750 for the second-place winner; \$500 for the third-place winner; with prize money awarded down to the 10th-place winner, who receives \$100. All cattle that meet the *Certified Angus Beef* ® (CAB®) brand carcass requirements receive an additional \$50.

Blake Brockway, Indianola, Iowa, won first place with his 1,160-pound (lb.) steer. His steer had a dressing percentage of 63.45%, a USDA Yield Grade (YG) of 2.00 and a high-Choice quality grade. Brockway's steer qualified for the CAB

Brockway says he plans on using his prize money to help pay his tuition at Iowa State University (ISU), where he is an agribusiness major.

This was the second year that Brockway has entered a carcass steer. He placed 10th in the 2002 carcass contest and credits his success to a combination of genetic performance and feed management practices used to achieve optimum results.

"We've selected cattle with solid carcass traits, and we closely monitor their feed program," Brockway says. He raised his entry, Primetrend 207, a May 2002 son of MGSA New Trend 903.

John Pfeiffer, Mulhall, Okla., was second with his 1,178-lb. steer. The reserve champion carcass had a carcass weight of 723 lb., giving it a 61.38% dressing percentage. Pfeiffer's steer produced a YG 2.24, low-Prime carcass that qualified for CAB Prime. This year's performance was impressive, considering he won first place in last year's contest.

"We've been breeding for carcass quality for a long time," Pfeiffer says. "We look at what the packers want. Understanding the sire summary has also been key to our program."

Pfeiffer says he plans to put his award money back into his cattle projects. "I've learned how to feed cattle and work with the different rations," he says, admitting that, "The carcass steers do get fed better than the feeder calves."

The McCabe family of Kim-Mac Farms, Elk City, Kan., continued their solid performance in the carcass contest. Five of their six entries made the top 10 in this year's contest.

This success carried over to help the McCabe's home state in the state carcass group competition. Teams from Kansas claimed both first and second place, with the first-place team comprised of steers entered by Flinton, Ethan and Hannah McCabe.
