## What a show

The week was officially designated *National Angus Week* by Missouri Governor Bob Holden, in a proclamation delivered during the opening ceremonies of the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) Tuesday, July 13, by Missouri Senator David Klindt. A crowd of some 2,400 spectators and nearly 700 exhibitors cheered as dignitaries arrived in Hale Arena on the grounds of Kansas City's American Royal Complex in a wagon pulled by a beautifully matched pair of Missouri mules.

### Jazzy décor

The arena décor accentuated the theme of "Angus and All That Jazz," paying tribute to the world-renowned jazz music for which Kansas City is famous. The backdrop, shrubbery and fences were astonishingly appropriate to the theme. It was obvious that untold hours of planning by a large number of people had been devoted to the preparation for and execution of an incredible event, and that it was.

Angus breeders and enthusiasts who have never attended the NJAS have not had the privilege of observing one of the most inspiring and uplifting events in the world.

From the time cattle began arriving until they departed the grounds six days later, the entire event was a frenzy of activity. In fact,

at times it seemed that there was not enough time to accomplish each task.

### Numerous competitions

While the means to the end is a cattle show, the event is much more. It not only involves the exhibition of skills in the showing; it also provides many other competitive events in which members of the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) who do not perhaps have the opportunity to exhibit cattle can participate.

I never cease to be awed by the culinary skills and creativity exhibited in the Auxiliary-sponsored All-American *Certified Angus Beef*® Cook-Off.

Junior members spend countless hours behind the lenses of a camera, capturing images of cattle, landscapes and people for the photography contest. Many of these photos will be used later by the Association and the *Angus Journal*.

The poster and scrapbook contests were awesome displays of the intelligence and artistic ability of these young men and women.


Every Angus breeder in America should have the opportunity to hear participants extol the virtues of the animals they use in the team sales competition.
