

# IN THE NEWS

**Dave Smith,** Greensburg, Ind., has been named the 2004 inductee into the Indiana Breeders' Association Hall of Fame. Smith, an American Angus Association Board Director, was honored for his achievements and leadership in the beef industry. As herd manager at Stewart Seeds near Greensburg, Ind., Smith has spent the last 31 years improving the Angus herd, utilizing artificial insemination (AI), ultrasound and performance testing.

Wayne "Doc" Smith, Winigan, Mo., will be inducted into the Northeast Missouri Livestock Hall of Fame Dec. 3 during the 2004 Missouri Livestock Symposium. He will be named the 2004 Northeast Missouri Livestock Person of the Year and will be presented with a hand-painted portrait of himself. Smith is being honored for his longtime leadership in the Missouri cattle industry as a Missouri Angus fieldman, veterinarian and youth supporter.

Monte Bordner and family, Sturgis, Mich., were named the Purebred Breeders of the Year by the Michigan Cattlemen's Association (MCA). Throughout the past 41 years, Bordner and his wife, Robin, along with their children, have operated Bordner Angus Farms. The Bordners have exhibited and marketed their cattle at various county and state functions, and Monte helped establish the MCA bull test in 1988. He has served three terms as MCA president and helped foster the Michigan Cattleman magazine and the MCA Purebred Council. He is currently serving as the chairman of the Tuberculosis Advisory Committee for the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

#### IN PASSING

Harry Green, 81, Lakewood, Colo., died Sept. 5.

Publisher Emeritus of *The Record Stockman*, Harry was born in Greeley, Colo., and attended the University of Denver. He served in World War II and later attended the University of Colorado while working as herdsman at Painter Cattle Co., Roggen. After graduation, he joined *The Record Stockman* as a fieldman and became publisher in 1963.

He was a director of the National Western Stock Show (NWSS); the Brighton, Colo., Board of Education; and the Colorado Boy's Ranch. He was a founding member of the Livestock Publications Council (LPC) and The Livestock Marketeers.

He is survived by two sons, Dan and Gibb; stepson, John; stepdaughter, Donna; nine grandchildren; and 15 great-grandchildren.

Frank G. Rea, 84, Carrollton, Mo., died Aug. 30.

He was born Sept. 26, 1919, in Carrollton, Mo., to John and Abba Robinson Rea. The



third of five children, Frank graduated from Carrollton High School in 1937. While a student at Oklahoma A&M (now Oklahoma State University), Frank, a member of the Oklahoma National Guard, was activated into the U.S. Air Corps. He married Lyda Jeanne Brown on Dec. 28, 1944. She later died from cancer in 1963.

Upon his return from military service in 1945, he attended the Saint Louis School of Embalming in Saint Louis, Mo., and was employed at the Marshall Funeral Home in Carrollton. On Feb. 9, 1948, he began working for First National Bank in Carrollton, serving more than 56 years in various roles, including chairman of the board.

After the death of his father in 1954, Frank became the owner of the Moss Creek Angus herd, one of the oldest Angus herds in the nation. Established in 1879 with animals purchased from George Grant's original imported herd, the operation has remained under continuous Rea ownership for 125 years.

Frank married Amel Ethington on Dec. 20, 1969.

He was a member of several civic organizations, including Carroll County Shrine Club and the Carrollton Development Corp., and he served as treasurer of the Public Water Supply District No. 1. He was secretary-treasurer of the Carroll County Angus Breeders' Association, and was an avid hunter and fisherman.

He is survived by his wife; two children, Stephen Price and Shelley; three stepchildren, Rochelle, Reid and James; grandchildren; 20 great-grandchildren; and four great-greatgrandchildren.

**Dan Schuyler "D.S." Moss,** 67, Enfield, N.C., died Sept. 7 at Wake Medical Center.

He was born Oct. 12, 1936, to Nae and Thomas Moss. He graduated from North Dakota State University in 1958 and became a farmer and cattleman in the Ringwood Community of Halifax County. According to *The News Observer*, D.S. had the longest consecutive Angus cattle sale ever hosted in North Carolina — at 25 years. He was past president of the North Carolina Angus Association and the North Carolina Cattlemen's Association, and founder of the Halifax County Cattlemen's Association.

He is survived by his wife, Harriet; two daughters, Danelle and Eva; one son, Tom; and four grandchildren.

The Hall of Fame program, which began in 1986, recognizes researchers for outstanding achievements in agricultural science. Inductees are nominated by their peers and must be retired or eligible to retire to receive the honor.
