Information at your fingertips

With recent snow storms and hard frosts, it's amazing to think that in four to six weeks we'll be cutting alfalfa and that good ol' fescue will be getting ahead of the cows.

Commonsense would say we're heading into the cheap time of the year to feed a cow; this is when she does her job — converting forage to protein — best. But, as "Ridin' Herd" columnist Rick Rasby has pointed out, it isn't cheap to feed a cow — at any time of year.

Critical cost-control point

The annual cost to feed the herd these days can be mind-boggling. Increasing pasture rents, competition for feedstuffs and increasing input costs complicate efforts to control the feed bill.

Yet experts agree, nutrition is not an area in which cattlemen can afford to skimp. In the *Priorities First* research project conducted by Tom Field while he was at Colorado State University, cow herd nutrition ranked as the No. 1 management priority in the cow-calf business, followed closely by pasture and range management — also a large part of the nutrition equation.

Sponsored by the American Angus Association®, *Priorities First* is a comprehensive effort to prioritize management and economic issues for cowcalf producers. The study included questions regarding cost control. It's no surprise that respondents indicated "harvested forage and supplemental feed costs" as being the most critical cost-control point.
