When academia, breed associations and breed leaders can put aside their individual competitiveness for a few days for the betterment of the whole industry, it gives us the opportunity to look at challenges from a point of view we may not have considered. It helps us foresee problems tunnel vision may not have allowed us to see. In the end, it prevents us from making mistakes we might have made without a peer review and it helps us to hone ideas for more successful and efficient rollouts. Undoubtedly, a little competition keeps us on our toes and encourages us to continue to advance our programs and services for members and their customers.

No one organization has all the answers. No one entity can aspire to be the silver bullet for the industry. Rather, a viable industry relies on internal competition — competition that keeps us honest in our outlook, that necessitates our seeking greater efficiencies in what we do, that fosters improvement in every aspect of the business, and that holds us accountable to our customers in a competitive environment.

I worry that when universities, breed associations and private industry prioritize their competitive edge, seeing it as a means of survival, that the discussion will lessen. I worry that we will seek more patents and corners on the market than we will seek peer review. I worry that in arguing our case for why we should be No. 1 that we will lose sight of the fact that No. 1 in a dying industry is still dying.

Let's look for the tides that raise all ships and avoid breaks that split and cause the wave to crash.
