\$Values will change

It's as certain as death and taxes. As the economic assumptions underlying the dollar value indexes (\$Values) change, so will the \$Values themselves. The Association calculates these economic assumptions as a three-year rolling average and updates them on an annual basis. Updates for this year will kick in with the July 1 national cattle evaluation.

Most of you have lived through the changes in cattle and feed prices that have occurred the last three years. Overall, the changes are narrowing the range of the \$Values and shifting them down.
