## Look for delegate petitions in the mail

Preparations are being made for the 2015 Annual Convention of Delegates this November in Overland Park, Kan. Forms to nominate delegates to the Annual Meeting will be mailed to every active life and regular

Association member during the last week of March.

The nomination period is April 1-June 30. Each member is allowed to nominate one eligible active life or regular member who resides in the same state or district, including



himself or herself. The candidate should be highly involved in the Angus business, willing to attend the meeting and able to represent Angus breeders.

Signed nomination forms must be received in the Association office no later than June 30, at which time every qualified nominee will be included on a state ballot. State ballots will be mailed to the membership in July to vote for the final slate of state delegates. When you receive the petition, please return it promptly.

Symbols are used with a registration number to denote important information about an animal.

The American Angus Association currently recognizes the following genetic conditions:

Code	Meaning
AM	Arthrogyposis multiplex
CA	Contractural arachnodactyly
D2	PRKG2 gene mutation for dwarfism
DD	Developmental duplication
DM	Double muscling
DW	Dwarfism
HG	Horn gene
HI	Heterochromia irides
M1	nt821 mutation for double muscling
NH	Neuropathic hydrocephalus
OS	Osteopetrosis
RD	Red gene
SN	Syndactyly
WT	Wild type color gene

The following single-letter descriptors appearing after a genetic condition code shall have the following meaning:

- P – refers to a "potential" carrier based on an ancestor known to carry that specific mutation.
- F – refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be "free" of that specific mutation.
- C – refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a "carrier" of that specific mutation.
- A – refers to an animal tested for one or more genetic conditions and determined to be a carrier of two copies of that specific mutation. It may or may not exhibit the phenotype associated with that genetic condition.

The following letter designations describe cases in which there is more than one genetic condition present:

- XF – Free of more than one genetic condition.
- XC – Carrier of more than one genetic condition.
- XA – Affected of more than one genetic condition.
- RTF – Recessive trait free (produced 35 or more calves from daughters without a genetic defect).

**Western National**

Mark your calendars for April 15-19 for the 63rd Western National Angus Futurity (WNAF) and 42nd Western Regional Junior Angus Show. Events will be at the Reno Livestock Events Center. The Grand Sierra Resort and Casino will serve as the headquarters hotel.

Cattle must be checked in by noon Friday, April 17. Randy Daniel of Colbert, Ga., will judge the junior regional Saturday. Jack Ward of Cameron, Mo., will evaluate the WNAF open classes Sunday. Other activities include the Western States queen competition, junior showmanship contest, educational program, junior social, WNAF Committee meeting, and both board and general membership meetings of the Western States Angus Association.

Please note that there are two separate entry processes for the show, one for the junior show and one for the open show:

- ▶ Entries for the junior show should be made through the National Junior Angus Association and may be submitted online at [www.angus.org/njaa](http://www.angus.org/njaa). Click on the "Shows" link for online entry forms. The absolute deadline for junior show entries is March 2.
- ▶ Entries for the open show (including juniors showing cattle in the open show) must be made through an online system at [www.wnaf.org](http://www.wnaf.org), a website created for the show. The open show deadline is midnight, March 15. Substitutions will not be allowed after March 22. **Download foot-scoring spreadsheet**

American Angus Association members can now download a spreadsheet to submit foot scores via their AAA Login account. Details of the Association's new foot-scoring system were outlined in the February *Angus Journal* in the "By the Numbers" column (see page 142) and the article "Solid Footing" (see page 162).

To download the spreadsheets in AAA Login, click the "Spreadsheet Entry" tab. From that menu select the "Foot Score Spreadsheet." Click the "Instructions" link for step-by-step procedures explaining how to select a group of animals, download the Excel spreadsheet, fill it out and return it to the Association for processing. The instructions also provide a description of phenotypes warranting each score, links to the *Angus Journal* stories and links to other pertinent information.

The data will be compiled in a data set that could lay the foundation of a genetic prediction tool for foot structure and soundness. Additional educational tools will be available soon. **Watch for DMI information**

Association members will soon see a new EPD showing up on their registration papers and various reports provided by the American Angus Association. We've noted how the Association has enhanced its dollar value indexes (\$Values) by including an expected progeny difference (EPD) for feed intake in calculations for feed value (\$F) and beef value (\$B).

The feed intake EPD, reported in pounds of dry matter per day, had been calculated behind the scenes as a component of the residual average daily gain (RADG) EPD. It is supported by both feed intake data and genomic profile information.

Producers requested that a DMI EPD be reported, as well, so they could dig deeper into what factors affect the broader index values. The Association is responding to that request, making the EPD available on performance documents.

**Foundation scholarship applications available**

The Angus Foundation will award a number of undergraduate and graduate scholarships this year. Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the 2015 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Tulsa, Okla.

The eligibility requirements for these general Angus Foundation scholarships

remain the same. Angus youth who are graduating from high school or in college currently may also be eligible for other Angus-related scholarships that are permanently endowed and managed by the Angus Foundation.

The Foundation will also make available graduate student scholarships to young men and women actively involved in the Angus breed who are pursuing advanced degrees.

Applicants must have, at one time, been a National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) member and must currently be a junior, regular or life member of the Association. Strong preference and priority will be given to applicants pursuing advanced degrees related closely to the beef industry.

**New initiative to engage future cattle producers**

To meet the needs of future cattle producers, the American Angus Association in March 2015 will launch a new program called Future Angus Stockmen. The intent is to impact the next generation through learning opportunities, while building a bond with the Angus breed and its member-driven organization.

The program is aimed toward college-age or recent graduates who want to raise high-quality Angus-based cattle. The program will offer educational opportunities that teach participants how to thrive in the cattle industry, social networking to connect them with fellow producers, and leadership development to instill an entrepreneurial spirit and drive to improve their businesses.

Participants will learn how to use proven information such as expected progeny differences (EPDs) and dollar-value indexes (\$Values), while incorporating DNA

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technology to make data-driven decisions. Additional program benefits include enrollment in either AngusSource® or AngusSource Genetic, and access to Beef Record Service (BRS) or MaternalPlus® at a reduced cost for submitting data.

Young people who enroll in the program will have the chance to apply for scholarships if they are or will be enrolled in a two- or four-year college majoring in agriculture. Scholarship winners will be announced at the 2015 National Angus Convention & Trade Show Nov. 3-5, 2015, in Overland Park, Kan.

### Allied Angus Breeders Scholarship

The Angus Foundation Board of Directors approved funds to provide \$1,000 scholarships to three youth who use Angus genetics in their seedstock or commercial operations. Awards will be given out in July 2015.

Applicants must be enrolled in a junior college, four-year college/university or other accredited institution for the fall of 2015. They can be an entering freshman or a continuing student in any undergraduate program.
